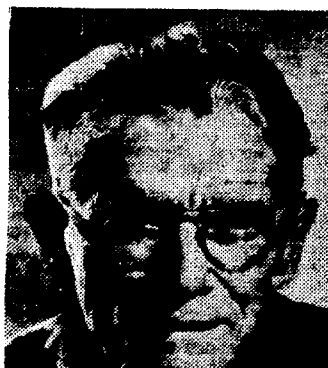

Uncle Ray's Corner: A scene in the desert south of Korosko. which people usually think about as deserts. There are plenty of these sandy areas. Africa and Asia have more of them than other continents. Of the sandy deserts in Asia, the largest is the Arabian. This vast waste has about 1,000,000 square miles in it. Another important waste in Asia is the Desert of Gobi, north of China. It covers much of Inner Mongolia. The size has been estimated at about 300,000 square miles. The Sahara has mountains a mile and a half high, but there are other parts where the ground is at sea level, or as much as 100 feet below sea level. In certain places, a person may have sandy wastes around him for hundreds of miles in all directions. The Sahara is classed as a "hot desert," and it surely is hot during the daytime. The sun beats down on the sand, and in the afternoon the sand may be heated to 150 degrees above zero Fahrenheit. The sand loses its heat quickly at night, however, and scientists have found that they may be expected to disappear; the sandstone will become drifting sand! Sometimes a field of ice is called a desert. The huge island known as Greenland is mostly covered by an "ice desert." Yet it is the sandy wastes sometimes it gets down to the freezing point before dawn. (For TRAVEL section of year scrapbook.)
