Rector Raps Federalizing Jobless Pay

WASHINGTON—(U.P.)—The Interstate Conference of Employment Security Agencies opposed federalization of unemployment compensation, Stanley Rector, counsel for the Wisconsin industrial commission, said Friday.

Rector, representing the conference, told the house ways and means committee that "we are firmly opposed to federal supply of unemployment benefits and to any federalization of unemployment compensation."

The state legislatures, he said, are in the best positions to judge what is best for the states in setting compensation rates.

The proposed bill, he told the committee, is "not a reversion bill but a retardation bill because its effect would be to retard reversion instead of speed it up."

Cream Restriction Held at 19%

Delivery of cream and cream products with fat content exceeding 19 per cent is still restricted, Gordon Gunderson, Wisconsin director of the U. S. department of agriculture, said today.

Restrictions affecting sale of milk, light cream under 19 per cent, buttermilk and chocolate dairy drinks were removed recently.

Gunderson said that only milk handlers, restaurants, hotels, bakeries, and similar establishments who certify they will use it only in manufacture of frozen dairy foods may receive cream of greater butterfat content and they, in turn, are restricted in the use to which they put such cream. They are not permitted to sell whipping cream or other cream of higher than 19 per cent butterfat to consumers.

Use of milk solids in filled cream is restricted to 75 per cent of the handler's monthly base.

Gunderson said that the use of total milk fat in frozen dairy products is still restricted to 65 per cent of the quality used by the manufacturer in the corresponding month of 1944.
