4,200 War Prisoners Await Liberation

YOKOHAMA, Sept. 1—(AP)—Approximately 4,200 Allied prisoners of war remain to be evacuated from Japanese camps in the Tokyo-Yokohama area, Cmdr. Harold Stassen reported today. More than 1,490 already have been moved to hospital ships and transports in Tokyo bay.

Stassen, Adm. Halsey's staff officer in charge of evacuating the prisoners, conferred with International Red Cross representatives

on progress of the liberation program.

Fairgoers Await Opening Of Event At Van Wert

VAN WERT, Sept. 1—Thousands of fairgoers are expected to move into this city for the 89th annual Van Wert County Fair which opens Monday, Labor Day, and continues thru Friday, day and night. Basing his statement on the huge volume of entries in the many departments and advanced ticket sales, N. E. Suckey, secretary, said that the fair has great potentialities of being a record-breaker.

And everything points to just that—everybody's been looking forward to attending the fair. Family ticket sales are above a year ago and referring to tickets, Suckey said that all grandstand boxes and reserve seats which represented about two-thirds the capacity of the stand, for the opening day, had been exhausted two weeks ago.

Record entries are being filed in most departments, competing for a share in cash premiums totaling \$11,890.45, a new high for the society. Five additional tents are needed to take care of the overflow in the swine department. The cattle and sheep shows will be heavy while the horse show is expected to be short.

Poultry, pig stock, fine arts and domestic manufacture departments are filling fast. Farm products, due to the dry weather, and culinary because of the sugar shortage, may be below normal.

The deadline for filing livestock entries was Saturday at 6 p. m. and the deadline for all other departments is Monday at 6 p. m. Official activities will get underway Monday at 1 p. m. with a flag raising ceremony in front of the grandstand. Immediately following, more than 100 candidates, mostly World War II veterans, will be initiated into the American Legion by the ritual team of Post No. 47, Fort Wayne, Ind.

It's Derby Day at the track with seven events on the program for purses totaling \$1,700, including the \$500 derby. Running races will be held rain or shine. Opening night feature will be the presentation of Hoaglan's Hippodrome and Circus.

Harness racing will open Wednesday with four events, the 2:20 trot, 2:26 pace, 2-year-old trot and 2:20 pace, for purses totaling \$3,000. Held also will be the dairy production show, 4-H club dairy judging and the night stage show, "Revue Victorious," a Gus Sun production.
