

Ann Dvorak Sings Four Songs In Quilna Movie

Redeployment Schedule

(By The Associated Press)

Eight troop carriers are scheduled to dock at east coast ports today, bringing home from Europe more than 8,000 troops. Four of the ships are due in New York, three in Boston and one in Newport News, Va.

COUNTERFEIT RATION BOOKS DISCOVERED

OPA officials said the books were complete with signatures, "official" imprints and with full quotas of red, blue, green and spare coupons. The individual stamps were said to be "excellent reproductions."

Miller was quoted as saying he had purchased four of the books for \$150 each from a man he met in a dice game.
