Fleet Picked For Visit In Pacific

PEARL HARBOR, Sept. 28—(AP)—Fifty-four ships of the U.S. Third Fleet will be in U.S. Pacific coast ports for Navy Day celebrations on Oct. 27, the Navy has announced.

Previously, the Navy named 48 ships due in Atlantic coast ports on the same date.

The ships will bring home veterans eligible for discharge.

The Third Fleet commander Adm. Halsey, will come home aboard his flagship, the battleship South Dakota.

Other battleships bound for the U.S. west coast are the Alabama, Wisconsin, Maryland, Texas, Nevada, Iowa, Colorado, Arkansas, Virginia and Indiana. The home-bound carriers are the Yorktown, Bonhomme Richard, Shangri La, Bunker Hill, Independence, Cowpens, Hornet and Ticonderoga.
