GOVERNMENT WATCHES DDT "PREPARATIONS"

WASHINGTON, Sept. 29—(UP)—The government is preparing to crack down on manufacturers who are cashing in on the magic name of DDT with so-called "DDT insecticides" that are really of little or no value as bug-killers. The Agriculture department, it was learned today, soon will open the nation-wide drive by issuing complaints against firms and individuals suspected of violating the insecticide act of 1910.

Convictions under the act carry a fine of \$100 for the first offense. Subsequent offenses are subject to a penalty of \$200 and one year's imprisonment.

MacArthur May Appear At Probe

WASHINGTON, Sept. 29—(UP)—Gen. Douglas MacArthur may be a witness when congress Pearl Harbor investigating committee goes to the Pacific. It was learned today.

The committee already has decided it will visit Pearl Harbor, St. Paul and Tokyo also are possible.

The suggestion to hear MacArthur during the Pacific trip arose as a result of President Truman's statement that he does not expect the general back in the United States in the near future.

There is some belief that MacArthur, as commander in the Philippines when the Japanese struck at Pearl Harbor, might be able to contribute something to the committee's full-scale investigation of the circumstances surrounding the war-provoking blow on Dec. 7, 1941.

6,600 To Reach Home From Overseas Duty Saturday

(By The Associated Press) More than 6,600 servicemen are scheduled to arrive in the United States today from European and Pacific battle theaters.

The battleship Indiana is due in San Francisco with 855 men from the Pacific. Two ships, with about 750 troops from Europe, are due at New York, there with more than 3,000 men at Newport News, Va., and one with more than 2,000 at Boston.

troops including 9th signal company; 29th infantry regiment; 12th headquarters and headquarters battery of 8th division artillery, 722d field artillery battalion, miscellaneous personnel. (Aboard William Winzer) 29 miscellaneous troops.

REPORT ACCORD BETWEEN CHINESE, COMMUNISTS

LONDON, Sept. 29—(AP)—The Moscow radio reported today that Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek and Communist Leader Mao Tse-tung, who have been conferring at Chungking in an effort to settle China's internal political differences, had reached an agreement to reform the national government.

The broadcast said the agreement provided for wider political representation in the central government and for the holding of general elections at an early date.

The pact also was said to provide for demobilization of the Communist armed forces.

CLEVELAND, Sept. 29—(AP)—Jerry Murphy, 81, a veteran of 50 years service in the Cleveland police department and former superintendent of the police signal system, died yesterday after a long illness. In 1909, he invented the "Murphy box," a combined alarm system and signal system, which was later adopted by several other cities.

Fuse Developed Despite Spies

WASHINGTON, Sept. 29—(INS)—American scientists developed one of the nation's top secret weapons—the radio proximity fuse—under the shadow of Nazi spies who were sent to the U. S. to steal plans for the revolutionary war device.

This was learned today by careful study of a little-known order which the spies carried in 1941 instructing them to ferret out the secret of the "VT" fuse which is rated second in importance to the atomic bomb.

The pint-sized fuses fitted in U. S. artillery projectiles cause them to explode when they reach within 70 feet of the target.

The War department said that tests demonstrated that one out of every two VT-fused rockets fired from a fighter airplane could be counted upon to bring down an enemy plane at 1,000-yard range.
