Latest Star Showing In Movie Here

In attending a football or baseball game these dreary days no one knows whether he will get thru the game without a drenching. But one thing is certain, inside a theatre, rain or shine, you'll find entertainment.

It's not often that a new star is born but things seem to have advanced since the days when several years' apprenticeship in the theatre was needed in order to qualify one for the movies.

A new star is currently featured at Ohio theatre in the person of Elizabeth Scott. She is starred with Robert Cummings, Don DeFore and Charles Drake in "You Came Along."

Thursday, Oct. 11, at the Ohio will bring a premiere of "Rhapsody in Blue" the new movie based on the life of George Gershwin. The premiere will begin at 11:30 p. m. after the regular show.

Starring Peggy Ann Garner with a brilliant cast including Allyn Joslyn, Michael Dunne, Faye Marlowe and Mona Freeman, "Junior Miss" is continuing its run at the Quilna theatre.

The film tells the story of a madcap teen-ager, whose lively imagination sets her family's life topsy-turvy in what is being called the most hilarious series of sequences filmed in a long time.

A weird mystery involving the murder of a man who is doomed to execution in the electric chair forms the basis for the exciting film "Born For Trouble" with Van Johnson and Faye Emerson which returned to the Sigma theatre Saturday.
