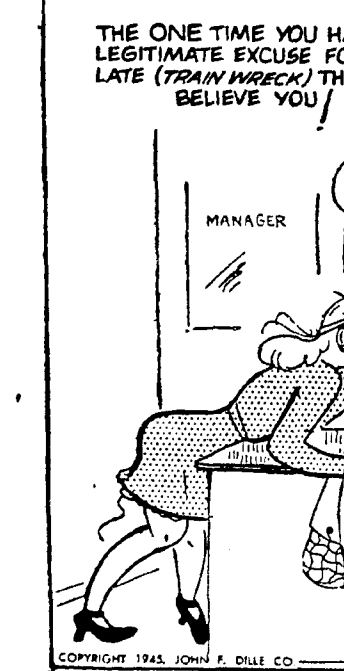

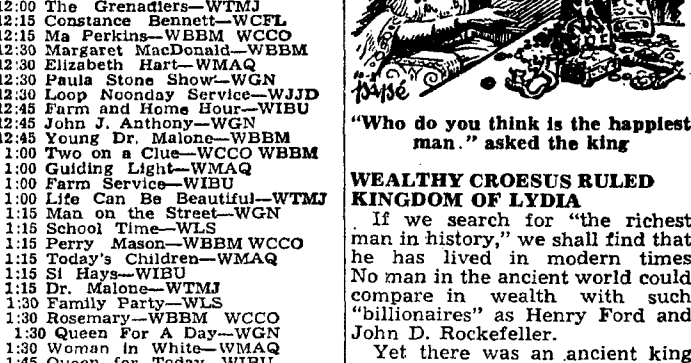

WEALTHY CROESUS RULED KINGDOM OF LYDIA.
If we search for "the richest man in history," we shall find that he has lived in modern times. No man in the ancient world could compare in wealth with such "billionaires" as Henry Ford and John D. Rockefeller.

"Why?" asked Croesus, who had expected to hear his own name mentioned.

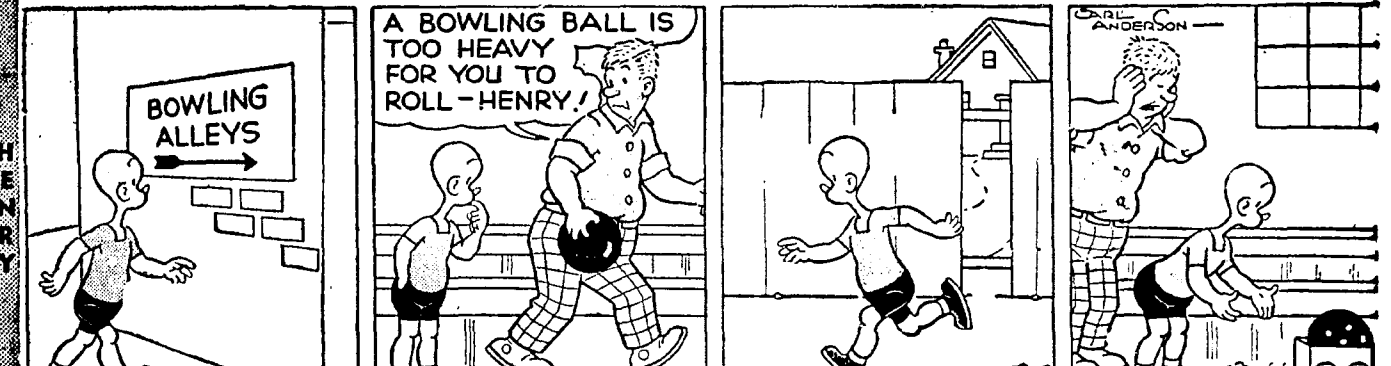
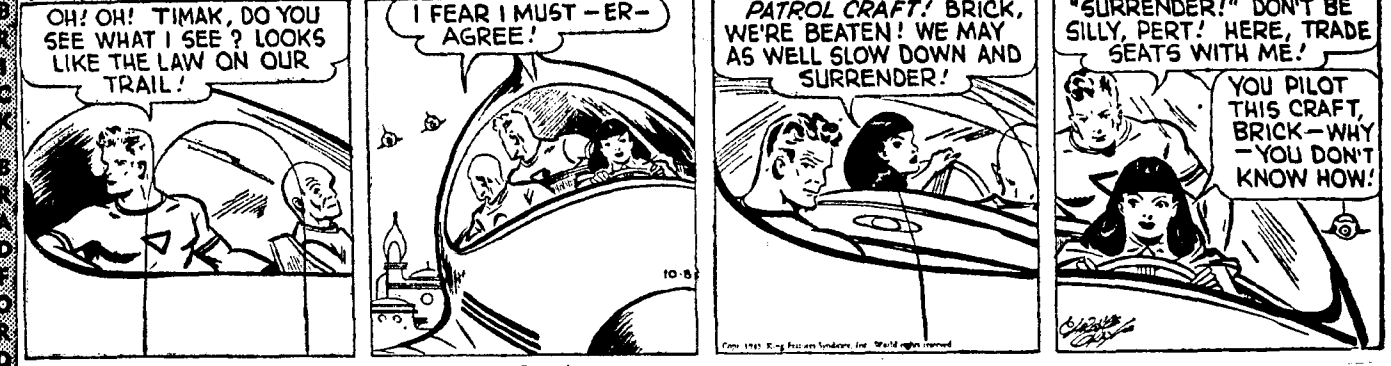
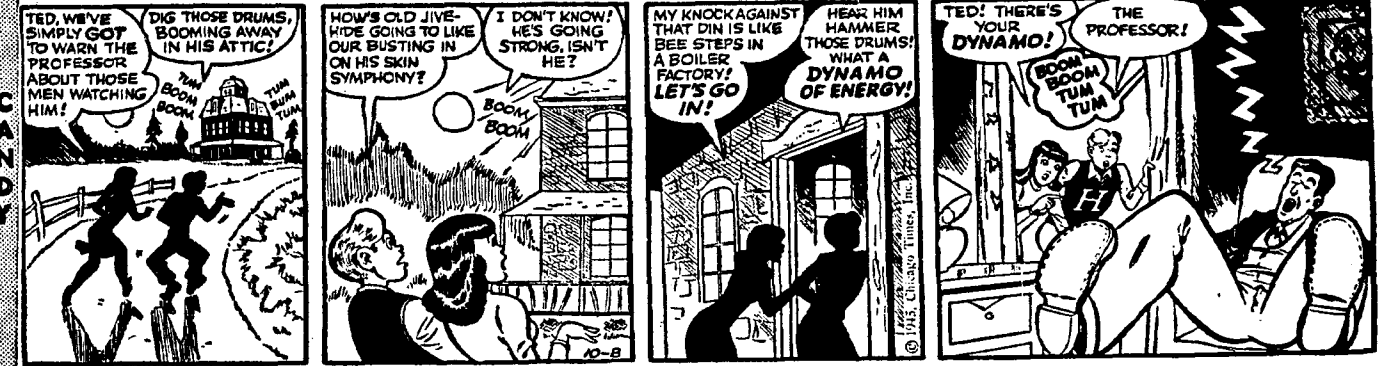
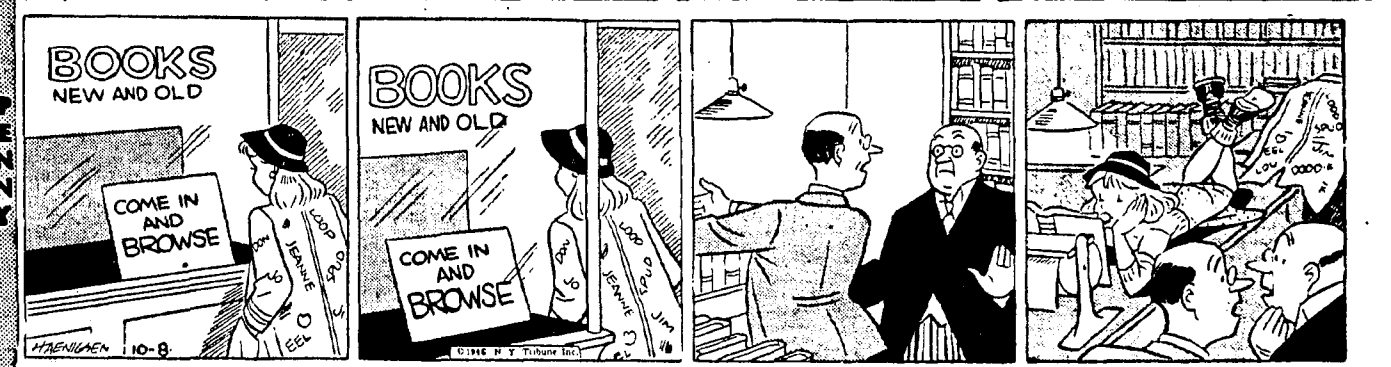
"Because Tellus had good sons, and saw them grow up and start their own families, and because in the end he met a glorious death while helping his countrymen to win a battle."
