Majority Doubt Bomb Secrecy

NEW YORK, Nov. 1—(UP)—More than 65 per cent of the American people believe the atom bomb will cease to be an Anglo-American secret within five years, according to a Fortune magazine poll, released today.

First other nation to develop the bomb without outside help will be Russia, according to 40.4 per cent of those questioned. Germany was the choice of 28.5 per cent.

Despite the bomb, Americans were slightly less optimistic about averting another big war than they were in April, Fortune said.

Only 51.1 per cent thought in October that the world had a "good chance" of avoiding another conflict within 25 to 30 years. More than 63 per cent had thought so during the San Francisco conference. Almost 47 per cent of those polled thought the atom bomb increased the chances for continued peace.
