Miss Foley, a graduate nurse who received her certificate in public health nursing from Marquette university, Milwaukee, will replace Mrs. Alice Sanborn Grove, who left to join her serviceman husband.

Since October the Visiting Nurses have directed health supervision at the Baptist church nursery school, in addition to their service at the War nursery school and at the Lakewood school.

# String Group to Present Concert Today

The Chicago String ensemble, conducted by Rudolph Reiners, will be presented at the Wisconsin Union theater today at 4:15 p. m. in a special concert signaling the Union music committee's 20th Sunday Music Hour.

The ensemble is made up of 13 players from the Chicago Symphony orchestra, Reiners, the conductor, is a noted young violinist. Seven violins, two violas, two cellos, a bass, and a piano will be used to present the program of classical and semi-classical music.

The first Sunday music hour was presented in 1929 with a concert by the Kodroff male quartet which was presented to the university by the late Charles R. Crane, father of Mrs. H. C. Bradley. The Kodroff quartet appeared five times on the Sunday music hour under Crane's auspices. With the cooperation of the university school of music, the Sunday music hours have become a tradition with students at Wisconsin.

The music committee is dedicating this 20th concert to the late Helen Holden Ingersoll who was chairman of the committee in 1943-44. She was also concert mistress of the University symphony from 1942-44.

The program presented by the Chicago string ensemble will include Mozart's Short Serenade; Bloch's Concerto Grosso for String Orchestra; Brahms' Prelude in E major; Grieg's Quintet for Piano and Strings; Strauss' Tale from the Vienna Woods; Rossini's Holiday for Strings; Tschai-kowsky's Walse; and Kreisler's Tambourin Chinois.

The concert is free for Union members and the public is invited to attend for a small fee.

# 35 Reich Publishers Get Licenses to Print

NEW YORK—(ONA)—Appropriately enough, the title of one of the first books which American occupation authorities will allow publishing in Germany is "The Rebirth of the German Spirit" by Dr. Karl Bach, the Swiss theologian.

Dr. Bach, a former professor at the University of Bonn, was compelled to quit Germany before the war after he became persona non grata with the Nazis.

Thus far 35 publishers and 4,000 bookstores in the American zone in Germany have received licenses to resume business. No blacklists of books will be published and each publisher must bear the responsibility for the books he prints, according to a BBC German language broadcast recorded here by NBC monitors.
