NEW YORK-(ONA)-Appropriately enough, the title of one of the first books which American occupation authorities will allow published in Germany is "The Rebirth of the German Spirit," by Dr. Karl Bach, the Swiss theologian. Dr. Bach, a former profes-

sor at the University of Bonn, was compelled to quit Germany before the war after he became persona non grata with the Nazis.

Thus far 35 publishers and 4,000 bookstores in the American zone in Germany have received licenses to resume business. No blacklists of books will be published and each publisher must bear the responsibility for the books he prints, according to a BBC German lauguage broadcast recorded here by NBC monibroadcast
