

Hasso And Craig Featured In "Dangerous Partners"

Signe Hasso and James Craig have the starring roles in "Dangerous Partners," the picture which will open Thursday at the State theatre. Packed with action from beginning to end, the film presents a plot which heretofore never has been matched.

Sharring the bill is "Abbott and Costello In Hollywood" and the picture is just about what the title sounds like—funny. What these two clowns do to Hollywood motion picture making industries shouldn't happen to a "rumpus room." From swinging around on the boom of one of the largest cameras in Hollywood to walking the catwalks above the scenery, the film is a riot.

In 1877, the Mississippi river divided a nation. Eastward was civilization; and westward, stretching for thousands of miles, were the badlands of the Dakotas, the roaring, brawling cattle towns of Cheyenne and Abilene and the free range of Texas. After a series of recently successful roles in modern dress, Errol Flynn is cast in "San Antonio" now showing at the Ohio theatre, as Clay Hardin, an embittered cattleman who seeks to pin a charge of brand-changing and rustling on treacherous Roy Stuart, played by Paul Kelly, the owner of San Antonio's notorious Bella Union Music hall.

"Sunbonnet Sue" now at the Quina theatre, has some authentic reproductions of many New York scenes. One for instance is the two-block stretch of the Bowery, teeming with picturesque life of the period. The great steel structure of the elevated railroad casts the entire street in gloomy shadow, and horse-drawn wagons compete for the right-of-way with huddy-gurdies and hucksters' carts.

Robert Walker and Keenan Wynn get into everything, including mud, up to their necks in "What Next, Cpl. Hargrove" now showing at the Sigma theatre.

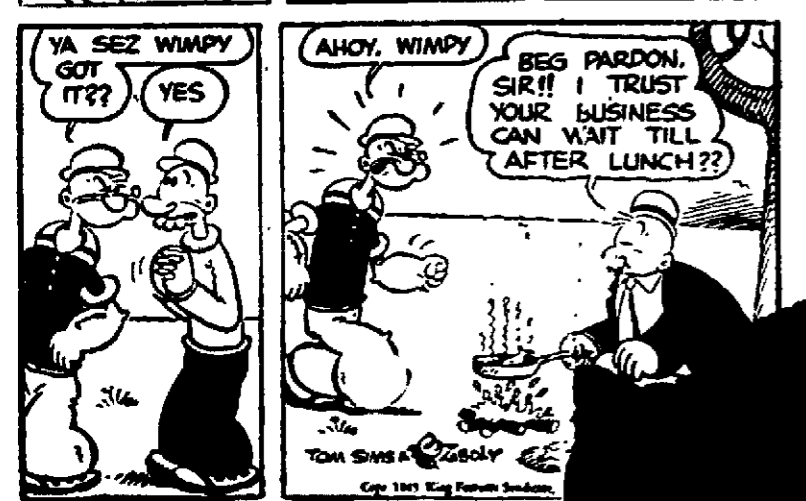
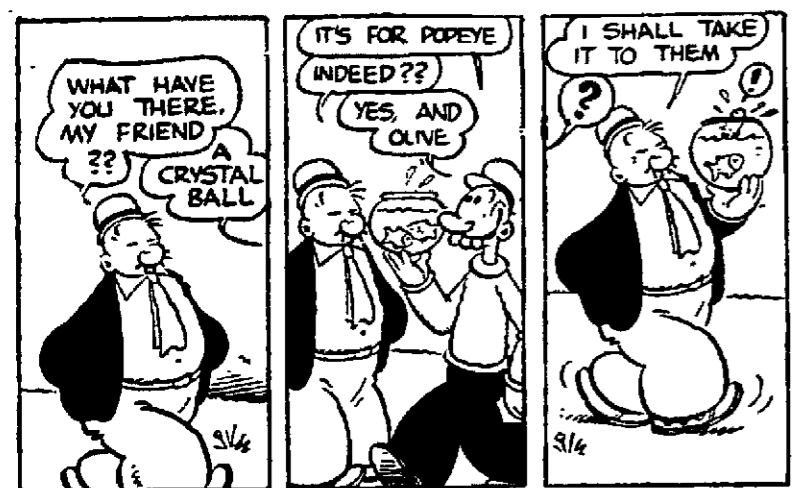

The comical situations are highlighted by some of the good things they do but the story revolves, mostly, around their blunders.

Constance Moore and Dennis O'Keefe highlight the bill at the Lyric theatre where they currently can be seen in "Earl Carroll's Vanities." Sharring the bill is "Santa Fe Saddlemates."

Lum and Abner, those two old gents heard daily over the radio can be seen in "Two Weeks To Live" the hilarious story which tells of Abner's premonition of death. The co-feature is "Trigger Law." Coming Thursday for one day only will be "Isle of Missing Men" and "Two-fisted Justice."

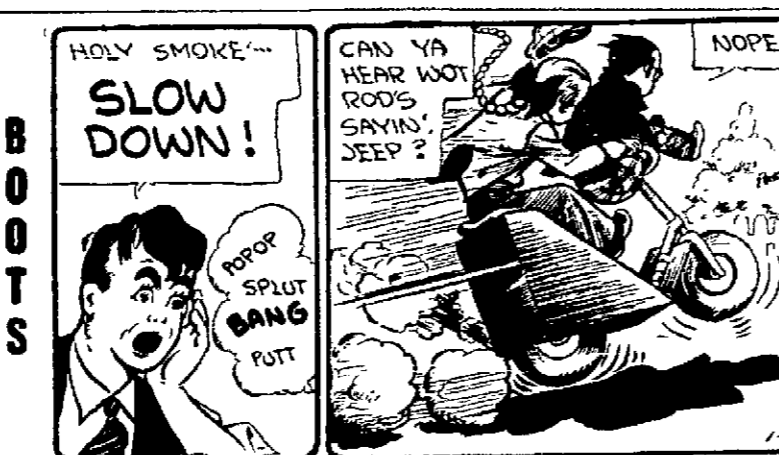
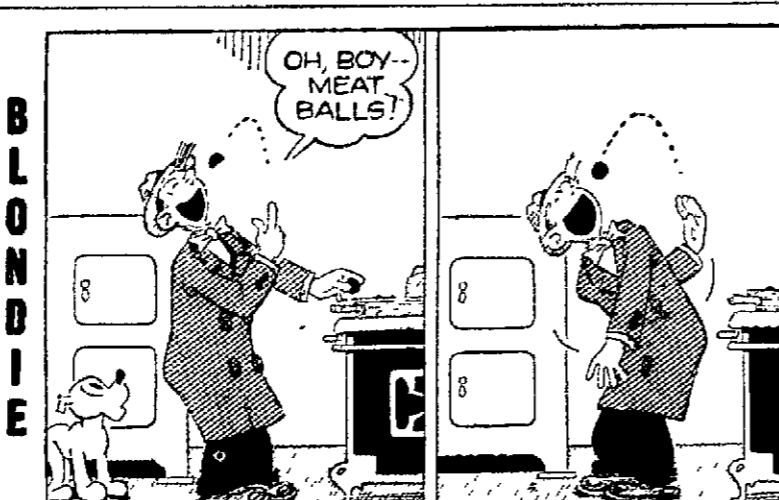

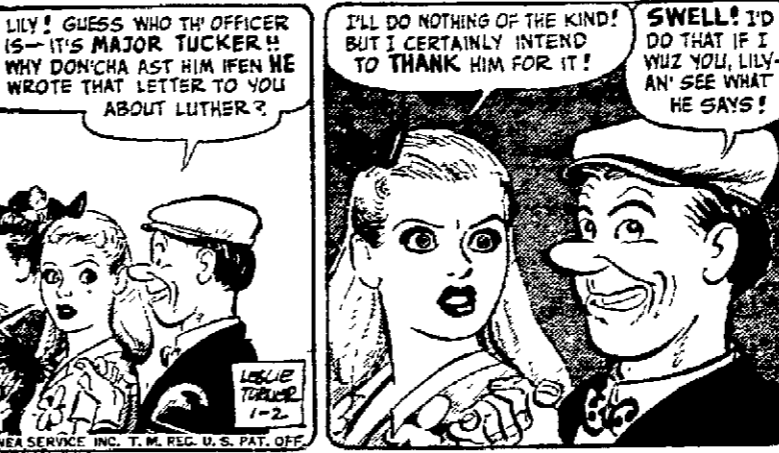
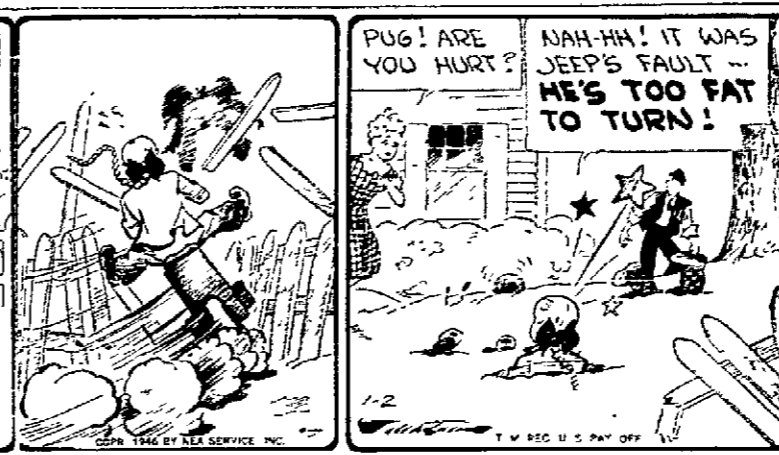
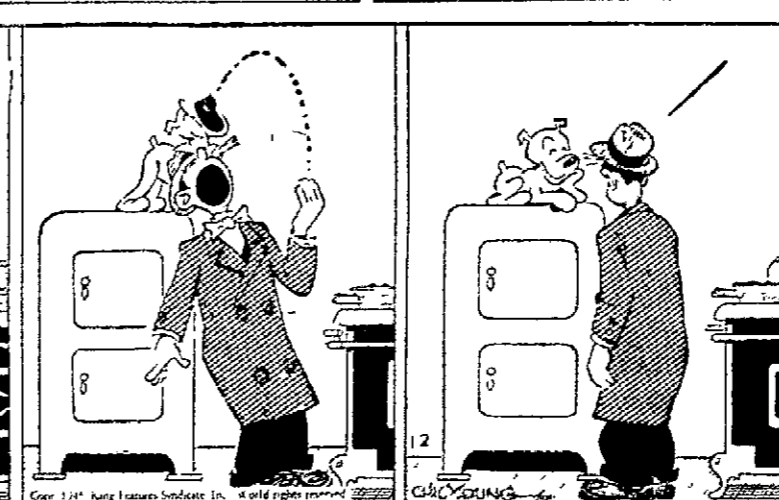


WAPAK SCHOOLS REOPEN

For bigotry undermines the fundamental principles avowed in the Declaration of Independence, the constitution and the bill of rights—the human and humane documents which charted and chartered a new way of living—our American way of life!
