

# Number of Top-Rate Films on Lima Screens

## Stars Galore Display Art in Local Houses

Sunday brings a number of pictures, which have been highly interesting to fans and which have commanded a good deal of inquiry, to the screens of the local theatres.

Currently featured at the Quilna theatre is the film "She Wouldn't Say Yes" with Rosalind Russell and Lee Bowman. Telling of a very well-known and learned psychiatrist, the picture has Miss Russell treating the case of a girl who believes that her kisses are fatal to men. Trying to get her over this inhibition, Miss Russell finds she has inhibitions too, ever that she hadn't thought about it before.

At the Ohio theatre, the film "They Were Expendable" with Robert Montgomery, John Wayne and Donna Reed, has been thrilling audiences.

The picture relives the story of the men of that famous PT boat who delivered Gen. MacArthur to the safety of a submarine just before the fall of Bataan. The many other battles in which the many small crafts were engaged are told here too.

## Two Killed in Fire at Home

WINCHESTER, Ky., Jan. 12.—(UP)—Two women were burned to death and two other persons were injured today in a fire which destroyed a farm home three and one-half miles from here on the Lexington road.

The dead were identified as Mrs. C. W. Burrus, 53, and her mother, Mrs. Sarah Hall, 78. The injured were Mrs. O. R. Perry, 28, who suffered severe burns, and her four-year-old daughter, Barbara, who was burned on the hands. Mrs. Perry and the small child were treated in a hospital where the mother's condition was described as "serious."

The two-story eight-room frame dwelling was occupied by both the Burrus and Perry families. The fire was believed to have started in the kitchen.

## Pyromaniac Being Hunted

AURORA, Ill., Jan. 12.—(INS)—Police sought a pyromaniac today who imperiled the lives of 60 elderly men and women in Aurora by attempting to set two buildings afire.

The first attempt by the arsonist was made at Jennings Terrace, a home for aged men and women. Firemen found oil-soaked rags at the scene and an undischarged .38 caliber cartridge. The fire was extinguished with little loss.

A second blaze was extinguished a half hour later in a nearby garage. The fire had been started when a gasoline-filled bottle was exploded. An undischarged .38 caliber cartridge was found near the bottle.

## UNRRA Funds Top 3 Billion

WASHINGTON, Jan. 12.—(UP)—The 47 member nations of the United Nations Relief and Rehabilitation Administration had paid or pledged \$3,611,942,710 to UNRRA by the end of 1945.

UNRRA said the total included new contributions of \$1,722,469,869 from the United States, United Kingdom, Canada and the Dominican Republic. None of these countries was invaded.

Russia has paid \$1,000,000 of its \$1,750,000 quota. Nations invaded during the war are asked to contribute only to the administrative expense fund.

## Test of Labor Law Planned

COLUMBUS, Jan. 12.—(INS)—State Industrial Relations Director J. Harry Moore acted today to obtain another court test on the constitutionality of the section of Ohio labor law which bars women from driving taxis.

Moore ordered an inspector in the Cleveland office of his department to arrest one of the women drivers of the Cleveland Yellow Cab Co.

The Cleveland firm has continued the use of female chauffeurs despite the Dec. 15 deadline for replacing women help in restricted jobs.

International News Service learned exclusively that the decision to test the law was made after a meeting between Moore, his assistant director, Richard Tobin, and Jesse T. Smith, general manager of the cab company.

It was reported that the company, which also is desirous of testing the law, agreed to the arrest.

Only previous court action on that section of the labor regulations was a Franklin-co courts' decision in 1928 holding it to be unconstitutional and ruling that cabbettes could be employed by Columbus taxi companies.
