

'We Accuse,' Film Document, Starts at Lyric on Monday

"We Accuse," the highly controversial film document of the first war crimes trials held in Kharkov by the Russians, had its first showing at the Lyric theatre Monday where it has arrived for a two-day engagement.

The film opens with pictures of the Wehrmacht in action, moves to the trial in Kharkov of the four accused, then flashes back to scenes of the Germany they grew up in—militarized, bent on conquest, convinced of its superiority. It traces the roots of the Nazi philosophy back to its basis in German culture, shows the growth of the Hitler movement, its private armies, its street riots, its goose-stepping adherents. It bares the truth—no holds barred.

Coming up Tuesday at the Quilna theatre will be the romantic, stirring picture, "Leave Her to Heaven" with Gene Tierney and Jeanne Crain. Making its bid for the Academy Award, the picture shows excellence in production and direction. Adapted from the novel of the same name, the film proceeds to show in picture form how jealousy can be the root of all evil, rather than money in some cases.

Currently playing at the Ohio theatre is "Stork Club" with Betty Hutton, Barry Fitzgerald and Don DeFore. The picture tells of a millionaire who feels that because a young lady pulled him out of the ocean, he should show his appreciation. This he does by giving her an apartment in one of New York's finest hotels, all the clothes she wants, a limousine, a chauffeur, and practically anything her heart desires. These things only lead to complications when Betty's Maine boy friend, Don DeFore, arrives home.

Robert Hutton and Joan Leslie turn out a magnificent performance, just as they did in "Hollywood Canteen" in the film "Too Young to Know" now showing at the State theatre. Sharing the billing at the theatre is "Follow That Woman" with Nancy Kelly and William Gargan. The latter film tells of a young wife who decides to take over her husband's place of business when he leaves for the Army. The only trouble is that it is private detective. The fun that ensues is terrific.

Opening Wednesday at the Allen theatre will be "The Iron Major" with Pat O'Brien. Currently playing at the theatre is "Wanted by the Police" with Frankie Darre.

BUCYRUS GAS SERVICE RETURNS TO NORMAL

BUCYRUS, Jan. 21.—(UP)—Bucyrus residents had a normal gas supply again today after a 10-hour period Friday in which all gas to the city was cut off after a power shovel severed a large main.

Trains into the city were ordered stopped until the air cleared to avoid a possible explosion. Restaurants, bakeries and industries were forced to close, and many homes were without gas for heating or cooking.

The Ohio Fuel Gas Co. sent 50 men thru the city Friday warning residents to turn off all connections in their homes before service was restored shortly before midnight.

ESCAPED POW STILL MAN WITHOUT COUNTRY

NEW YORK, Jan. 21.—(INS)—An escaped Italian POW who stowed away on the Liberty ship Theodore Bland two months ago still was on the high seas today a man without a country. Alfredo Raffaels, 24, hid on the vessel at Casablanca last November after escaping from an American prison camp in Tunisia. When the Bland arrived at Baltimore, immigration authorities refused him permission to land and the Bland took him to Antwerp where he was denied entry into Belgium.

He still was aboard the Bland last night when the ship, again departing U. S. shores, sailed away into the darkness for an unannounced destination.

Charges Cattle Buying Illegal
TOLEDO, Jan. 21.—(INS)—In the first suit of its kind filed in federal court in Toledo, the Schmidt Provision Co. of Toledo was charged today by the Cleveland district Office of Price Administration with purchasing cattle at over-ceiling prices.

Walter J. Heedeshimer, district enforcement attorney who filed the case, said that the action was instigated in a determined effort by the OPA to stop alleged overcharges at the source and to prevent them from being passed on to the ultimate consumer.

The OPA asked an injunction prohibiting further violations. The defendant, according to the petition, made the overceiling payments in July, August, October and November.

Styron, former vice president of the Styron-Beggs Co., Newark chemical manufacturers, it was shown by an inventory filed in probate court yesterday.
