

# New Quilna Film Continuing Successful Run at Theatre

Hailed as the first psychological drama ever to be filmed in technicolor, starring Gene Tierney in her most important role to date, Cornel Wilde in his first modern romantic part and Jeanne Crain in her first adult screen assignment, "Leave Her to Heaven" continues to thrill audiences at the Quilna theatre.

The film, which opened three days ahead of schedule has Gene Tierney playing the subtly psychopathic young wife, Ellen Berent, who will stop at nothing—even murder, to be loved as completely as she loves.

Cornel Wilde who became a star overnight, is seen as the man who inspires Ellen's possessive passion and jealousy. Jeanne Crain, who had a sensational debut in pigtail since her movie debut in pigtail two years ago in "Home in Indiana" is seen in her first adult role in the picture.

At the Ohio theatre in the film, "My Reputation," the warmly moving story of a beautiful woman's desperate search for happiness, is grippingly told. Starring Barbara Stanwyck, the film replays the heart-rending saga of a woman's second chance at love and of the vicious scandal that brings heartache into her life and life of her family.

As a young widow-mother of two lovable boys, Miss Stanwyck plays another highly dramatic role of the sort which aided her rise to fame.

Giving the new Dick Powell another stirring dramatic role to follow his success in "Murder, My Sweet," "Cornered" presents the actor in a remarkable story of an avenger's quest.

Powell goes to France in search of the murderer. He learns that a man named Jarnac was responsible for the death of his life, and despite plausible reports that Jarnac was himself killed by terrorists, he suspects the man is still alive.

Through clever sleuthing, Powell traces Jarnac's widow to Switzerland and from there to Argentina, where he finds her involved with a gang of picturesque conspirators. The film will open Saturday at the Sigma theatre.

Dennis O'Keefe turns out another hilarious performance in "Getting Gertie's Garter," the film now showing at the State theatre. The film tells of a young married man who for some particular reason, must regain a certain piece of wearing apparel from a chorus girl. The manner in which he goes about doing so is perhaps one of the funniest pieces of acting ever turned in from Hollywood. Sharing the billing is "Daltons Ride Again" with Kent Taylor, Alan Curtis, Lon Chaney and Noah Beery, Jr.

Maria Montez, Susanna Foster, Jack Oakie and Tuhau Bey have the starring roles in the current "Bowery to Broadway," at the Lyric theatre. The film will bow out Saturday midnight to allow "Night Club Girl" and "Range Busters" to step in to replace it. George Romero hits the jackpot for funniness in "Viva Cisco Kid" now showing at the Allen theatre. Romero adds zest and life to this film which had its opening Friday at the theatre.

## Employment of Minors Drops

COLUMBUS, Jan. 25—(UP)—Employment of minors in the state during 1945 showed a marked drop from the previous year, it was revealed today in a report by the State Department of Industrial Relations.

The number of work permits issued totaled only 127,553 during 1945 as compared to 189,286 permits during 1944 when employment of minors hit its wartime peak. Industrial Relations Director J. Henry Moon reported.

Of the total number of work permits issued to minors last year, 37,572 were to 16 and 17-year-old boys and girls for full time jobs, the report showed.

## BOARD STUDIES DEATH APPEALS

### Two Lorain Murderers Are Scheduled To Die

COLUMBUS, Jan. 25—(INS)—The State Pardon and Parole Commission today studied clemency appeals filed on behalf of two Lorain murderers condemned to die in the electric chair next month.

Before the commission were the cases of Frank Naberger, alias Haring, and "Poppy" Harlan, and Ralph Brown.

Naberger was convicted by a jury of the Feb. 17, 1937, fatal throat slashing of Mrs. Mary Wallace in her Lorain home.

Brown was given the death sentence by a three-judge court for the Jan. 4, 1944, stabbing of Miss Helen Katonak. He is a former roommate of Gordon Weisman, who last week was sentenced to life imprisonment for the murder of a Lorain serviceman's wife.

Arguments in the cases were heard by the three-member board yesterday.

Naberger's mercy plea was based on opinions from Rev. Paul Corbett, Ohio penitentiary chaplain, and other defense witnesses that the doomed man was incapable of premeditating Mrs. Wallace's murder.

Father Corbett described Naberger as a "sloppy man" whose thoughts were not "disciplined enough" to allow him to plan a deliberate murder.

Basil Dziana and Virgil Burgett, attorneys for Naberger, told the commission that the slaying was the result of an argument, started when Mrs. Wallace threw a newspaper at their client.

They also claimed that Naberger had been drinking "heavily" before he went to the Wallace home.

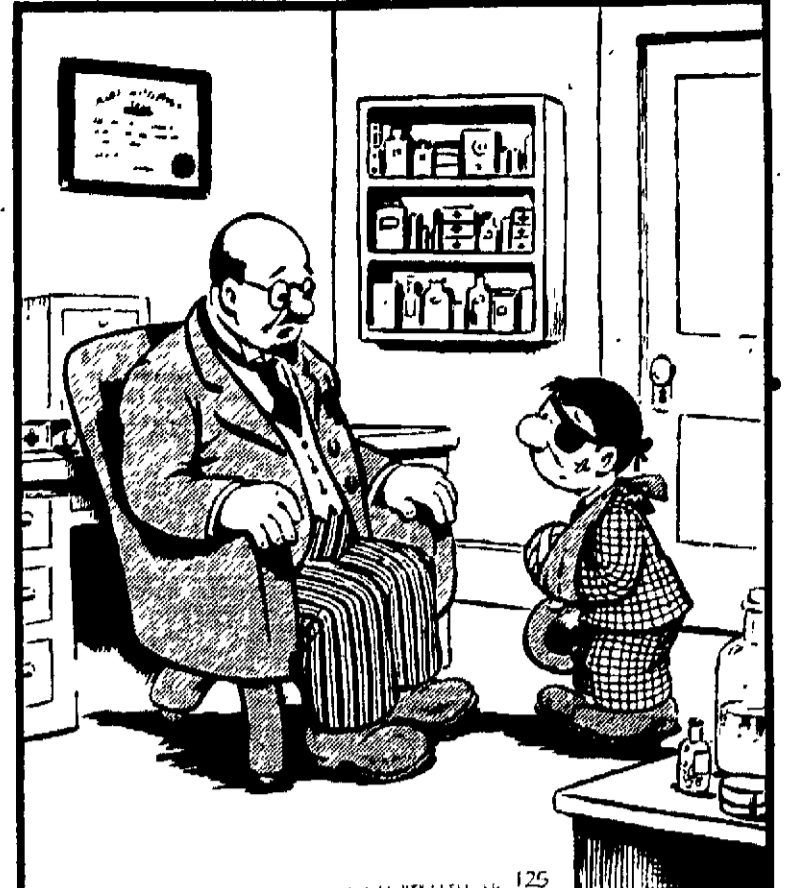

## Await Release Of Marion Site

WASHINGTON, Jan. 25—(AP)—The Scioto Ordnance Works administration buildings at Marion, O., will be released by the Army as soon as surplus property and War department officials agree on details, Senator Huffman (D-O.), said today.

The Army announced recently the property had been declared surplus but Huffman explained there was a hitch in preparation of necessary papers. This will be adjusted in a few days.

Both the state and the city of Marion want the buildings. Gov. Frank Lausche said the structures were designed for use as a state hospital. Rep. Smith (R-O.), wants the property turned over to the city for veterans housing.

The War department announced that other sections of the ordnance facility, not adaptable to other uses, would be declared surplus late this year.
