

Pacific War Told in Film Opening at Lyric Monday

The Pacific War is shown thrillingly from a new angle in "China's Little Devils" the drama which opens an engagement at the Lyric theatre Monday. For its fresh viewpoint, and for its manner of developing the possibilities of its story, the film qualifies as one of the season's most interesting productions.

Harry Carey and Paul Kelly are co-starred in the picture, and both turn in the quality of performance to be expected to two such capable veterans. Carey is a kind, gentle figure as the head of a mission for orphaned Chinese children, and Kelly is forth-rightly dramatic as a member of the famous Flying Tigers.

Barbara Stanwyck has turned in what many film critics would call her best performance on the screen since the beginning of her career in pictures. Miss Stanwyck, who is featured in "My Reputation" currently showing at the Ohio theatre, as a widowed mother, enacts the plight of a woman to find love again. And because of vicious gossip, nearly ruins the lives of two boys.

Another film which is a strong candidate for the screen's Academy Award is "Leave Her to Heaven" the film adapted from Ben Ames Williams' famous novel of the same name, now playing at the Quilna theatre. When a woman allows that slight flicker of jealousy for her husband to leap into flame and has the urge to wipe out anything which stands in the path of having him love her as deeply as she loves him, then a story, which is a story, is involved.

Quarrel Ends In Three Deaths

WASHINGTON, Jan. 28—(UP)—Three members of a family of four were dead today in a tragic climax to a discharged soldier's month-long quarrel with his wife.

John H. Fitzgerald, 34, veteran of the Philippines fighting, provided the bloody ending yesterday when he shot and killed his 24-year-old wife, Mary Adel, their two-year-old daughter, Mary Ann, and then blew off his own head with a 12-gauge shotgun.

Police said Fitzgerald might also have shot his other daughter, four-year-old Carol Ann, if she had not been whisked out of the way by Mrs. Fitzgerald's mother, Mrs. George W. Chapman.

The tragedy occurred in the Chapman home in suburban Hyattsville, Md.

Fitzgerald saw two-year old Mary Ann for the first time following his discharge from the Army Dec. 21. Relatives told police that he had quarrelled with his wife "almost continuously" since he returned from overseas.
