**NEW YORK**—Billy Bryant, the old Mississippi river showboat man, is anxious to get back to trouping on Ol' Man river.

"The government put me out of business during the war, when all shipping had to be essential," he said during a visit to the Stork club. "But I'm hoping to get me a new boat soon and go back to work."

Right now the hooper, self-confessed ham and impresario, is trying a new racket. The Colston Leigh lecture bureau, one of the largest of such outfits, is breaking him in as a platform speaker for the women's clubs and college groups.

"It isn't as good as acting, but so far I like it fine," Billy said. "I just get up and tell them about the showboat days on the river; give them some stories to laugh at. They tell me that's what these people want to do—laugh; that they're getting tired of being ing so much about the world's ills and need a little respite. Well, even being making people laugh for a long time along the river. These new audiences ain't much different in the long run."

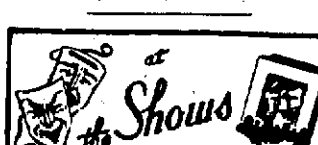
Billy himself looked trim and hearty and he said that his famous family was in the pink, although "the old folks are getting along."

I ran into Billy after he had made an appearance briefly on a special television broadcast over NBC's WNET station in Radio City. The 50-minute telecast, a mixture of film and "live" performances, mostly the latter, was "Children of Ol' Man River," a dramatization of part of Billy's career.

The show was unique in that it was a television version of the radio show which will be heard on Du Pont's Cavalcade of America broadcast Monday from Hollywood at 7 p. m. CST. It served almost in the role of a movie trailer telling of a forthcoming film, but with a reverse twist. Despite some production flaws, the telecast was much more interesting and entertaining than the radiocast can hope to be.

The Messrs. Russell Crouse and Howard Lindsay are relieving Paramount pictures of \$300,000 in advance payment for the screen rights to their hit show, "State of the Union." They also will receive 50 per cent of the picture's gross receipts after production costs. The fall of 1947 will see the picture's release.

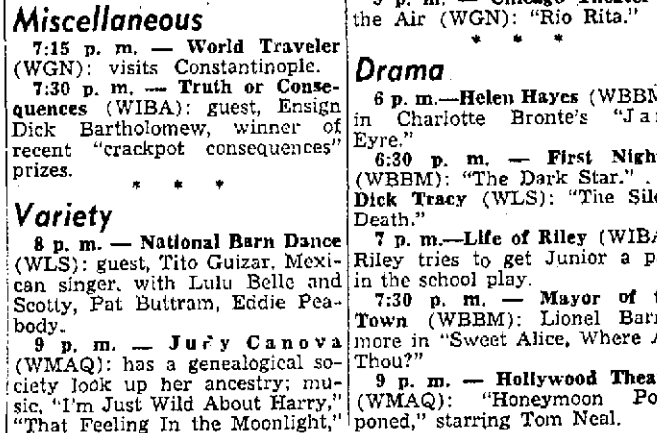

## U. S. Shipping Bids for Trade

Asks to Carry 50% of Loan Purchases

WASHINGTON (U.P.)—The American shipping industry plans to demand the right to carry at least 50 per cent of all goods purchased here by foreign countries with U. S. loans, it was learned today.

The request will almost certainly meet opposition from several other maritime nations and could provoke considerable debate at the London shipping conference, beginning next Monday.

The conference was called to break up the United Maritime Authority, the 18-nation pool which operated about 60,000,000 deadweight tons of shipping during the war.

Shipping industry advisers to the American delegation, made up of war shipping administration officials and state department observers, will:

ONE. Support official proposals for a new international pooling arrangement to succeed TMA during the reconstruction period.

TWO. Urge some kind of international agreement to limit world tonnage.

But industry sources said that protection of American shipping required not only these two measures but assurances that goods, purchased with foreign loans would be carried at least 50 per cent in U. S. vessels.
