Ohio Feature Stars Milland In Unique Role

Again, as in the past, variety is the keynote of the motion pictures scheduled for showing this Sabbath at Lima's theatres.

Those who read Charles Jackson's widely discussed best-seller, "The Lost Weekend," never had any idea such a shockingly realistic book would ever be exposed to the hot lights of a Hollywood studio. But it has been done and this story of a man's inner struggle, with Ray Milland playing the title role, is at the Ohio theatre.

The picture is not a pretty one. No punches are pulled and the audience is spared nothing of the horror which haunts a man afflicted with chronic alcoholism. It is the story of five merciless nights and days in the life of Don Birnam—a sensitive, intelligent person of 33 dragged to the dogs by weakness beyond his control. The torment Milland endures in this remarkable screen characterization exceeds the fire and brimstone of anything the most Satanic devil could devise.

At the Quinn theatre is a film depicting days of the pioneers when land was bought and sold at a drop of a hat or the explosion of a gun. John Wayne and Vera Hurla Ralston have the starring roles in this film which begins with the elopement of the couple and of their many adventures in "Dakota" the here-to-fore badlands of America. Sharing the billing is "Tell it to a Star" with Ruth Terry and Robert Livingston.

"Off we go into the wild blue yonder" with Maisie. Just the beginning of the Army Air Corps Song but it's added to the name Maisie, which assures you of a good time. At the Sigma theatre, Ann Sothern's current film as the lovely blonde brainless young lady "Up Goes Maisie" is wowing audiences. Her antics are incomparable and with that rollicking Irishman, George Murphy, who can hand out a line just as fast as Maisie can, the picture is superb for laughs.

A good time is offered to all at the State theatre where two hit films, "Spanish Main" stars Paul Henreid and Maureen O'Hara in one of the most dashing pirate pictures ever filmed.

The Lyric theatre, too, has two films which should interest mystery lovers. "House of Fear" stars Basil Rathbone and Nigel Bruce is packed with suspense and for all the amateur sleuths of Lima, it should prove quite profitable in their hobby of detecting.

Highlights Of New Books

History of Prairie Indians Is Chronicled

FOR nearly 10 years Alice Marriott painstakingly collected information from the Kiowa Indians about themselves. In TEN GRANDMOTHERS she relates their story, revealing the traditions and beliefs, the manners and customs, of these southwest prairie people. Almost 100 years of tribal history are covered in the reminiscences, beginning in 1847 with the war party against the Utes up thru 1942 with the unformed troops setting out against the Germans and Japanese. In between came the white man with his changes and the gradual assimilation into his way of life. These folk tales, told with simplicity and charm, are a distinct contribution to the literature of the American Indian.

Dancer Is Given \$100,000 Award

HARTFORD, Conn., Feb. 2.—(UP)—Mrs. Catherine R. Martin, 35-year-old former professional dancer, was awarded \$100,000 today by an arbitration board for burns suffered in the tragic circus fire here July 6, 1944, in which 168 perished and more than 600 were injured.

It was the highest award made by the board, which has so far approved claims against the Ringling Brothers & Barnum and Bailey Combined Shows, Inc., totaling several million dollars.

78,150 Killed By Atom Bomb

TOKYO, Feb. 2.—(UP)—The atomic bomb dropped on Hiroshima caused 306,545 casualties, including 78,150 deaths, an official report released by Supreme Allied headquarters said today.

The report said 13,983 persons still were missing and 9,428 were seriously injured by the blast from the first atomic bomb in history.

Another 27,997 men and women suffered minor injuries.

The report said that 176,987 persons surviving the explosion were considered "general sufferers," or persons who suffered from sickness, minor injuries, or lack of homes, food or clothing after the bombing.

The missing include 7,031 men and 6,952 women.

Coldwater Pushes Hospital Campaign

COLDWATER, Feb. 2.—Coldwater started a campaign Saturday for another \$57,000 to make \$250,000 available for the construction of Mercy hospital. The drive will end Feb. 23.

Of the \$195,000 now available, \$185,000 is in cash and \$8,000 in pledges. F. C. Ensign, secretary of the corporation raising the funds, said. Ensign added that the responsibility of choosing a location, designing the building, and operating the hospital will be up to the Sisters of Mercy, to whom the money will be donated.
