2 Firms Grant Pay Increases

DETROIT Feb 9 (UP)—The General Motors Corp. remained virtually the only holdout in the auto industry today after Briggs Manufacturing Co. and Champion Manufacturing Co. signed union contracts granting hourly wage increases ranging from 18 to 26 cents.

Progress in the prime stambling block—the giant General Motors dispute—tapered to a virtual standstill.

Both the Briggs and Champion contracts with the CIO United Auto Workers provided wage increases generally in line with President Truman's fact-finding proposals and gave added impetus to the trend toward industrial amity.

Briggs, producers of auto bodies and parts, agreed to an 18 1/2-cent hourly wage increase and other concessions for 12,000 employees in Detroit and Evansville, Ind.

The Champion agreement called for pay raises of 18 to 26 cents an hour, claimed to be the biggest increase in the industry thus far. It covered 800 employees.

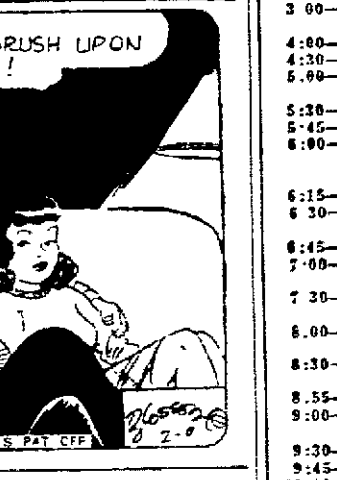
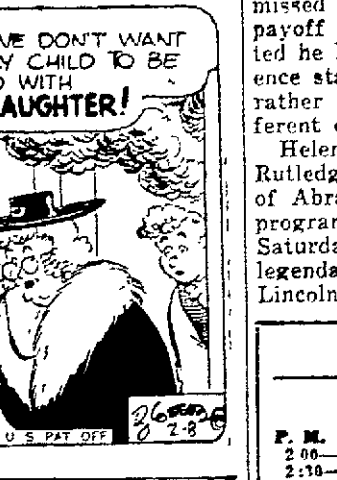
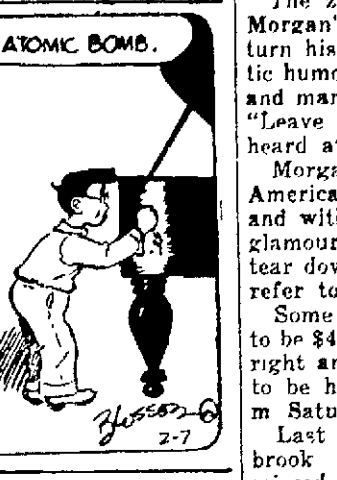
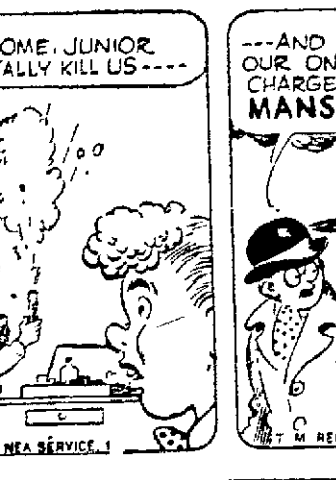
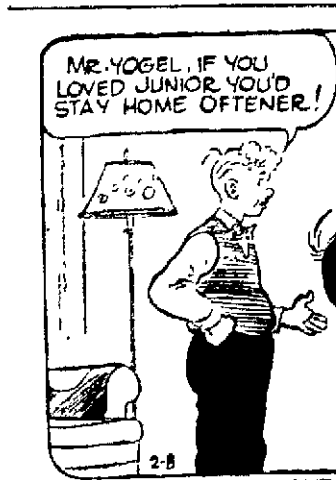
Wallace Lauds Progressives

NEW HAVEN, Conn., Feb. 9 (UP)—Secretary of Commerce Henry A. Wallace, who endorsed Johannes Steel, American Labor Party candidate for congressman from New York's 19th district, said last night he would remain a Democrat only "as long as the Democratic party remains the people's party."

Wallace addressed a meeting of the National Citizens Political Action Committee. He said "I am here tonight still fighting for the things Franklin Roosevelt fought for, and supporting President Truman in his fight for the progressive legislation that will continue to make the Democratic party the party of progress in this country. When the Democratic party ceases to be the people's party, it will die—and it will be well dead."

Wallace called on liberal and independent voters to turn out in strength at the coming congressional elections to support progressive candidates.

CLEVELAND, Feb. 9 (AP)—The death of Mrs. Elizabeth Newman, 80, today raised to 14 the toll of lives in a fire last Saturday at Jennings Hall, home for the aged.

Dr. Samuel R. Gerber, county coroner, said yesterday that of 13 other victims, only one died of burns. Carbon monoxide poisoning caused the deaths of the others, he said.

25,000 CIO Workers Vote Strike Action

LA PORTE, Ind., Feb. 9 (UP)—Representatives of 25,000 CIO workers today scheduled a strike Mar. 4 against seven plants of the Allis-Chalmers Manufacturing Co.

Officials of three unions, the United Automobile Workers, United Electrical Workers and Farm Equipment and Metal Workers voted last night for strike action in support of demands for a 20-cent hourly wage increase.

Plans involved are in La Porte, Springfield, Ill., Pittsburgh, Boston, Norwood, O. and West Allis and La Crosse, Wis.

Nylon Hosiery Shipments Rise

NEW YORK, Feb. 9 (UP)—Shipments of women's nylon hosiery last year soared to 1,551,743 dozen pairs from 7,356 in 1944, the National Association of Hosiery Manufacturers reported today.

However, shipments of rayon hose dropped to 32,697,761 dozen pairs in 1945 from 36,451,550 in the previous year. Total shipments of all types of hosiery amounted to 134,338,850 dozen pairs compared with 140,600,250.

Most of last year's nylon shipments were made in December when the figure hit 1,006,222 dozen pairs compared with but 382 in December, 1944. Rayon hosiery shipments aggregated 1,267,661 dozen pairs against 2,739,473.

Total shipments of all types of hosiery in December amounted to 9,106,806 dozen pairs compared with 10,534,574.
