(By Special Correspondent) WAUSAU - The biggest artificial feeding program in the history of Wisconsin deer manage-ment is under way in the forests of upper Wisconsin this winter. Conservation department officers reported to the conservation commission at a meeting here Mon-

day. By tractor, truck, toboggan, and backpack nearly 100 full and part time employes of the department have transported nearly 2,000,000 pounds of hay and grain concentrates to the remote deer yards of the Forest county to prevent starvution among the state's most important big game animals. The cost will be nearly \$50,000.

As a result of the discovery of

additional deer yards in the wilderness during intensive winter surveys of the last two years, the feeding stations have been increased to 582. About 80 of them are in Vilas county. A locality where public opinion has long and consistently been bitter toward the state's deer cropping program. Neil Lemay, chief forest ranger who is directing the emergency feeding effort, said that he esti-mates that 2,600 deer are being fed regularly in that county. Permanent Program
