Catholic Charity Drive On Mar. 31

Runs to Apr. 14 for Archdiocese

The annual campaign for Archdiocesan Catholic Charities will be conducted from Mar. 31 to Apr. 14, the Most Rey. Moses E. Kildy, archbishop of Milwaukee, announced today. The amount sought will be \$300,000.

The campaign will be conducted within the old boundaries of the Milwaukee archdiocese, including the seven counties which will be part of the new Madison diocese. Donations received from parishes in these counties will be for the use of the Most Rev. William P. O'Connor, in the charities of the newly established diocese. Counties which will be under Bishop O'Conner are Dane Marquette, Green Lake, Green, Columbia, Jefferson and Rock. Twenty-one institutions and

agencies carry on the work of charity in the Milwaukee archdiocese. These include homes for 23% infants, orphans, aged, depend-38 ent, delinquent and various agencies for social welfar work.
Operation of these institutions and agencies requires approxi-mately \$1,000,000 each year. Approximately \$750,000 of this has been received from sources other than the Catholic Charities Cam-

In anouncing the 1946 campaign, Archbishop Kiley said that \$50,000 of the amount obtained would again be devoted to the mily program of the Conservation of the Faith to help finance new parishes. This amount was also set aside from the 1945 campaign, the first time that provisions was made for this purpose.
