

Fair Days Revived at Lyric In Current Hit 'State Fair'

In ordinary times when a story about a fair was put into picture form, the studio producing the film would have sent a crew to a real one and let them get the scenes there on celluloid.

But when the picture "State Fair" was made, everything included in the film had to be set up on the studio lot and the film made there. The picture, now opening at the Lyric theatre, stars Dick Haymes, Dana Andrews, Vivian Blaine and Jeanne Crain.

It's one of the brightest musical comedies to hit the screen. Its songs have captivated movie fans so completely that they became hit parade leaders in no time at all. Sharing the bill is "Shanghai Cobra" with Sidney Sloger.

Currently showing at the Ohio theatre is "Spellbound" and the theme of the film will hold you just as the title suggests—spellbound. Canning Plants To Need 50,000

CLEVELAND, Mar. 11.—(UP)—J. Kimball Johnson, regional director of the United States Employment Service, said today that 50,000 workers would be needed this year to process fruit and vegetable canning crops in the Ohio-Kentucky-Michigan area.

Johnson pointed out that wartime sources of labor supply such as prisoners of war and foreign workers would not be available this year. He added that because of the housing shortage, most of the workers would have to be recruited from the immediate areas of food processing plants.

At the peak of the pack last year, Ohio used 4,000 prisoners of war and 2,000 immigrants and Kentucky employed 200 war prisoners, he said. In the three-state region, Johnson said, the canning season begins early in April and continues thru November.
