facturing Co., one of the manu-facturers of DDT and a new insec-ticide known as "666." bought the place from Mrs. Edward Stotesbury, widow of the famous Morgan Partner, in 1944. Scientists have been giving poor

flies the works down in the champagne room ever since Dr. Harry G. Walker, who now has his office in a reconverted bathroom where MacArthur once splashed, is one of the chief executioners of the insects.

"And I believe this new '666.' or benzene hexachloride that we're using is even more toxic than DDT." Walker said. "DDT remains effective longer, but this 666' has a heavier punch.

Walker, who likes to kill more things than just flies, figures that the boll weevil down south had better hunt for cover fast. "DDT doesn't faze the boll weevil," he said, "but, boy, walt until we get through spraying him with '666'".

The house that Morgan's part-ner built not only serves as an abbatoir for flies but also acts as the jumping off place for pea aphids, bean weevils, Mexican bean beelies, and anything else that Walker can entice past those gold-embossed doors.
