Lincoln, son of a wealthy Cleveland, O., industrialist, already has confessed the brutal hammer attack and shooting of the Williams girl. He is being held on charges of assault with intent to kill.

MILWAUKEE — (U.P.) — Dr. Frank E. Baker, 63, president of the Milwaukee State Teachers college since 1923, announced today that he will retire either late this year or early in 1947.

Dr. Baker said he had notified the state board of teachers college regents. He said he and his wife hoped to retire on a farm in North Carolina.

Dr. Baker was president of a normal school at East Stroudsburg, N. Y., before he came to Milwaukee in 1923. A native of Clymer, N.
