BELIEVE IT OR NOT By RIPLEY

TVA Chief Explains Rate of Advancement toward Improved Condition

CLEVELAND, Mar. 23—(AP)—The Tennessee Valley region has made more rapid progress economically since 1932 than the entire country. David E. Lilienthal, chairman of the Tennessee Valley Authority, declared today.

"By this I do not mean that the Tennessee Valley region is not still a region of low income," the TVA executive said in an address prepared for delivery before the Cleveland City club.

"That is strikingly true when a comparison is made either with the average of the country as a whole or with such wealthy states as Ohio and other industrial states. I am referring to rate of change, rate of progress toward an improved economic condition."

"The TVA has had and continues to have a share of vague denunciations and criticism," Lilienthal asserted. "But people are making up their own minds about it. There is now going on a silly campaign to smear the Tennessee Valley region, to picture it as under the domination of the TVA; and all the old enemies about socialism, totalitarism, etc., are being plastered all over the country."

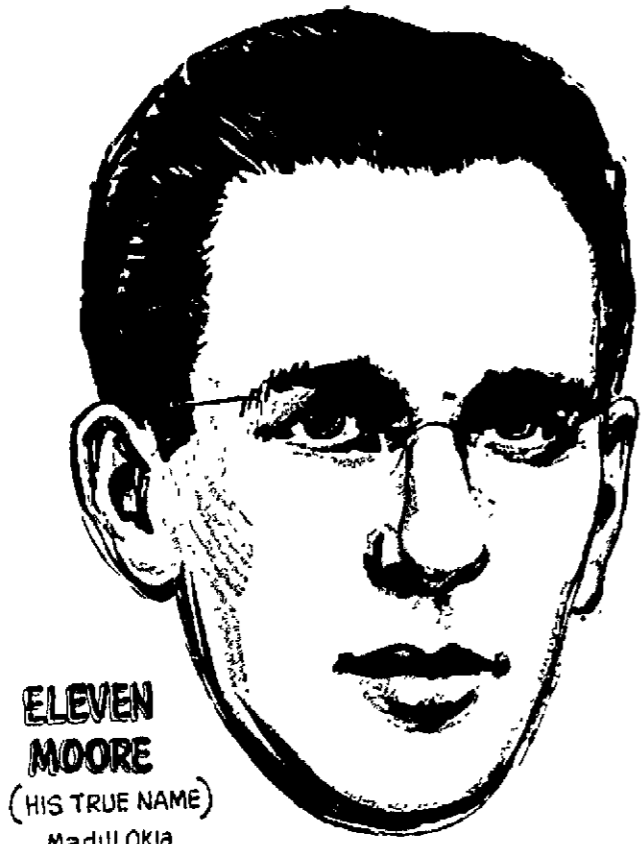

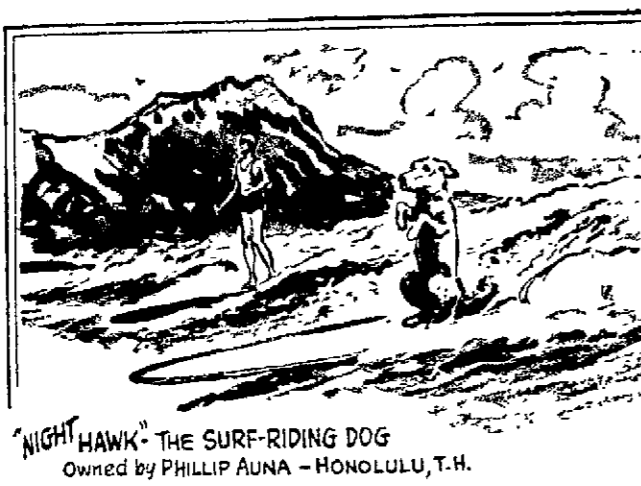

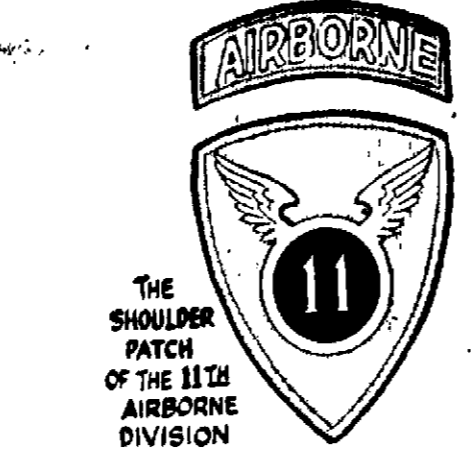
