

PSYCHIATRIST WANTED TO LOOK OVER ZOO CROW

Sammy, Director Says, Is Suffering from a Split Personality

CLEVELAND, Mar. 29—(UP)—Cleveland Zoo Director Fletcher Reynolds, impressed by Gregory Peck's recovery in Spellbound, today was hunting for a psychiatrist to look over one of his charges, Sammy the Crow, who apparently is suffering from a split personality.

The zoo's infamous crow, Reynolds said, is in need of an ornithologist psychiatrist, for unlike humans, Sammy is suffering from a three-way personality split. Reynolds describes it as "something's put the whammy on Sammy."

For Sammy's tattle-tale grey life goes back to last summer when he suddenly learned to speak English. He beguiled the zoo's visitors with his friendly "hello." But when they cleaned out his cage this winter, the zoo attendants found cached away nickels, dimes and quarters totaling \$3.72 bilked from the customers.

Then Sammy took up the study of two other crows to see what he could do about them. One was named Jim and the other was a stranger. Both died mysteriously overnight shortly after Sammy was placed in their cage and he was found huddled in a corner visibly shaken as if by some evil experience.

This episode became known as the "murder at the zoo." However, Sammy soon convalesced and looked into the problem of the ducks on the waterfall pond. Studying their language, Sammy became fluent enough with the "quacks"—albeit with a decided crow accent—to lure them.

The ducks resting peacefully on the pond were plainly intrigued with this new call. (Fletcher thought Sammy might have stumbled onto the mating quack.) They left the waters and waddled over frozen ground toward the cage. Result: the zoo cared for frost-bitten webs.

Discouraged by Sammy's seemingly incorrigible attitude, the still kindly zoo director transferred Sammy to new, private quarters the other day. Instantly Sammy became afflicted with this new and mental malady.

He can recall little of his three language accomplishments and his present quack is understood by neither crow nor man nor duck. But such is Sammy's fame that he is signed up a few weeks hence for a radio broadcast. Fletcher feels morally bound to have bilingual problem crow make the personal appearance.

Coal Industry Claims Double Security Costs

CHARLESTON, W. Va., Mar. 29—(UP)—The coal industry is paying "double the amount paid by competitive industries in providing social security for its employees," Jesse V. Sullivan, secretary of the West Virginia Coal-essan asserted in answer to demands of the United Mine Workers for a "common welfare fund" to be maintained by a royalty on each ton of coal mined by them.

In a prepared statement, Sullivan said "it is doubtful if the states or federal government would permit any one man or single organization to control a fund of such aggregate..." He added that the coal industry already made a greater contribution for social security for its employees than any other industry and pointed out that the "average labor cost of producing a ton of coal in West Virginia currently exceeds \$2. The labor cost of producing the equivalent of a ton of coal in the natural gas and oil industries was less than 50 per cent of this amount..."

MOTOR BUS GROUP ELECTS

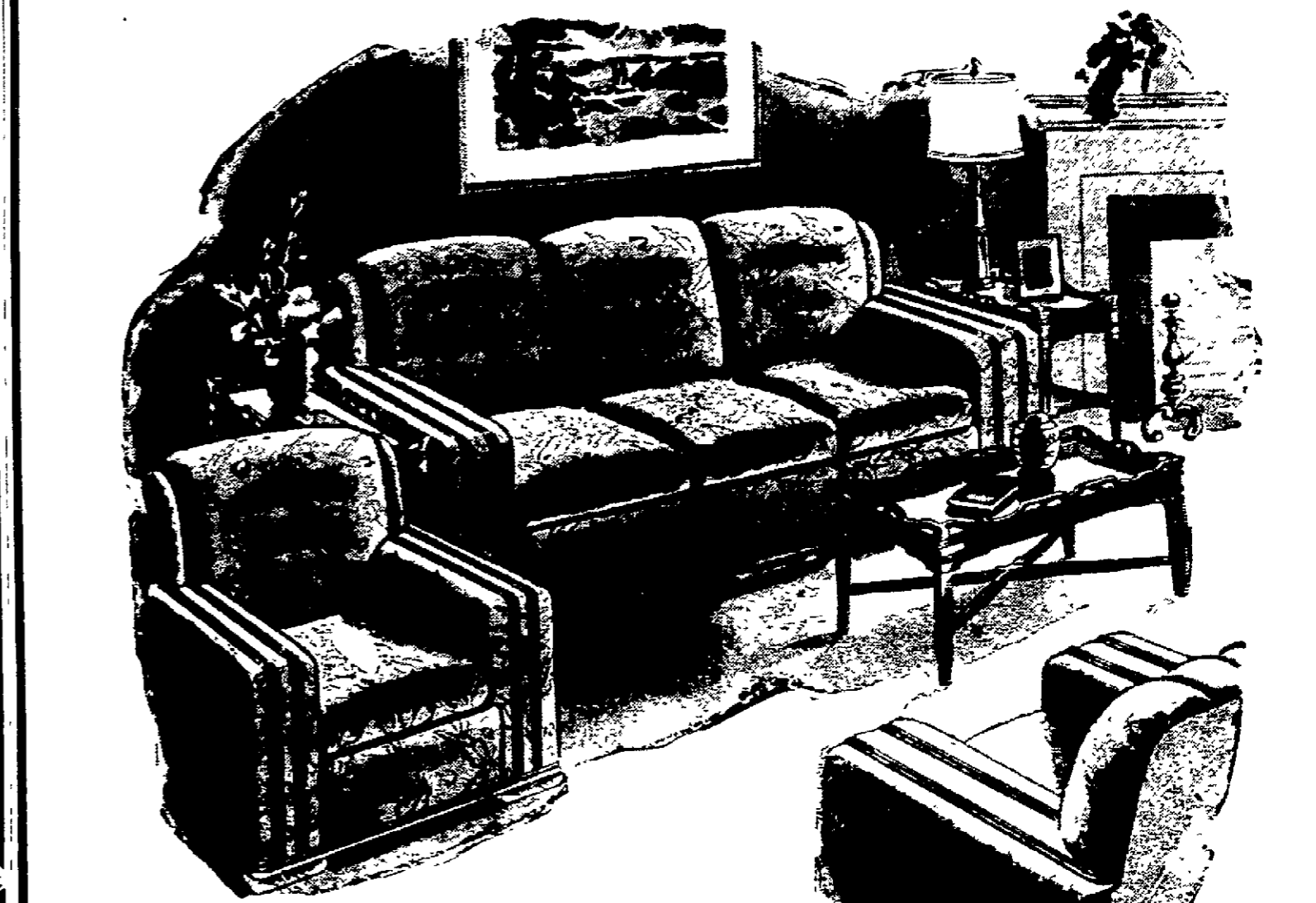

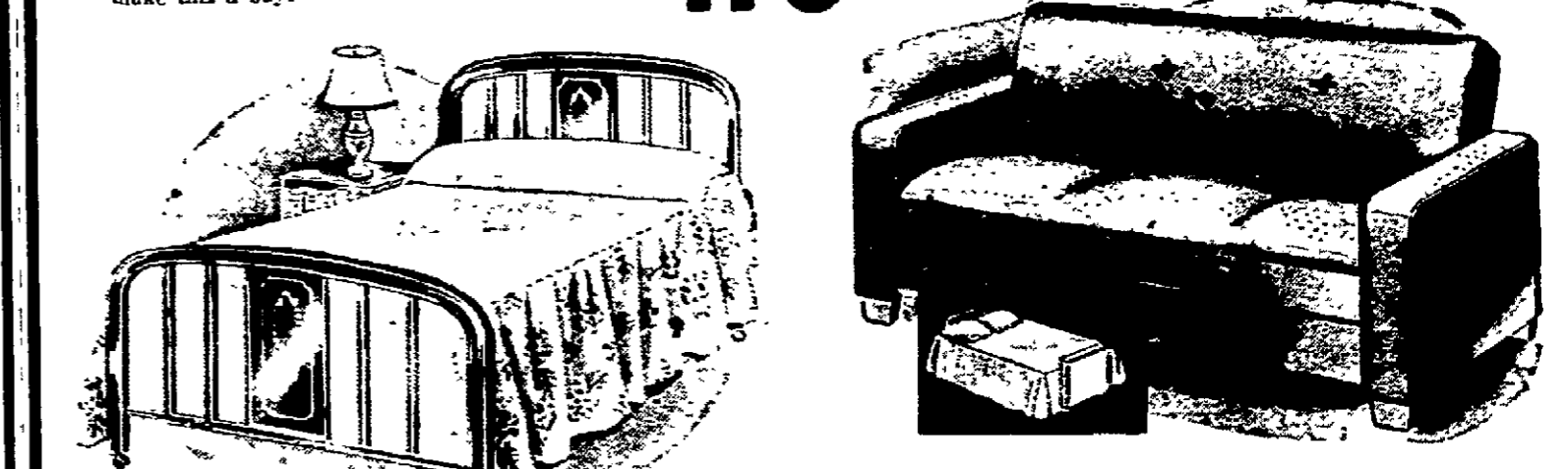
