## Agreement Ends Moraine Strike

DAYTON, Mar. 30—(AP)—More than half the 1,800 employees at the Moraine division of General Motors Corp., will receive pay increases above the 18 1/2 cents an hour granted nationally by the company, under an agreement which ended a 129-day-old strike at the plant last night, a joint company-union announcement said.

The union's local 696 voted 25 to 1 in favor of a new one-year contract with the company, and Wayne E. Taylor, personnel director of the firm, said maintenance workers were called back today to prepare the plant for the return of all production workers Monday.

The new wage agreement offers hourly-rated production employees, comprising 85 per cent of the personnel, a 23 cents hourly pay increase over the pre-strike wage rate, the announcement said.
