The British plan falls consider-ably short of what the French originally demanded, for it does not provide for detachment of the Ruhr from German central political control. But there is excellent reason for believing that Britian is not prepared to go beyond economic internationaliza-tion. The British, in other words, believe that international econ omic control is sufficient safe-guard against the Ruhr industries becoming the center of German rearmament as their plan permits of strict supervision of the distribution and delivery of all goods and raw material produced in the Ruhr.

TWO. Military control of the Ruhr. One plan calls for the continuation of British military control, another for division of the Ruhr into four zones, and a third for using the Ruhr as one of the for using the Ruhr as one of the strategic bases of the ultimate UN international police force.

Fond du Lac Teachers Get Raise

FOND DU LAC - (U.E) - The Fond du Lac board of education has voted a \$70 a year additional cost of living increase for all city teachers. The raise will boost to \$320 a year the amount of increase granted the teachers since


