

1,692 VETERANS IN OHIO AWAIT HOSPITAL CARE

VA Deputy Says Ex-GIs with Service-Connected Ills Get Priority

(Special To The Lima News)
COLUMBUS, Apr. 13—A total of 1,692 war veterans in Ohio was on the waiting list for admission to Veterans Administration hospitals as of Mar. 31, Deputy Administrator Ralph H. Stone said today.

Of this number 263 were veterans with disabilities resulting from military service while the others were non service connected disabilities. Veterans with service-connected disabilities have first priority for admission to hospitals, Stone said.

Michigan had 1,602 veterans and Kentucky had 28 veterans awaiting admission to hospitals on Mar. 31.

The Veterans Administration has ordered "full speed ahead" on hospital construction projects already underway in an effort to relieve current bed shortages in Veterans Administration hospitals throughout the country. In the three-state area, the Veterans Administration, where practical, has entered into contract with private hospitals for care of veterans.

Construction underway in the Columbus branch area (Ohio-Kentucky-Michigan) includes new buildings at veterans' hospital at Dearborn and Fort Custer, Mich., and Lexington, Ky. In addition, the Veterans Administration on Apr. 1 took over operation of the Army's Grille general hospital at Cleveland. Other hospitals maintained by the Veterans Administration are located at Chillicothe, Dayton, Brecksville and Outwood, Ky.

The Veterans Administration now is caring for, either directly or thru other authorized agencies, a total of more than 97,000 veterans in hospitals and domiciliary homes in the United States.

Long Lost Ship Finally Located

MIAMI, Fla., Apr. 13—(AP)—Discovery of the long lost Spanish trader sailer Santa Rosa, reputedly with \$300,000 in stolen Aztec gold aboard, was announced tonight by Irwin A. Williamson, famed sea diver.

Williamson said he found the coral-sealed hull of the Santa Rosa at 1 o'clock this afternoon in 146 feet of water off Key West.

"We removed the three identification marks which we put on the wrecked in 1940-41, before the war halted our further attempts to locate the treasure," Williamson said.

"We could not go deep into the hull to find if the treasure is still there, because the wood planks of the ship, buried in the sea since 1520, crumbled like potato. We were afraid it would fall apart. It took us 23 minutes to work our way thru the small entrance to the coral cave which completely engulfs the wreck."

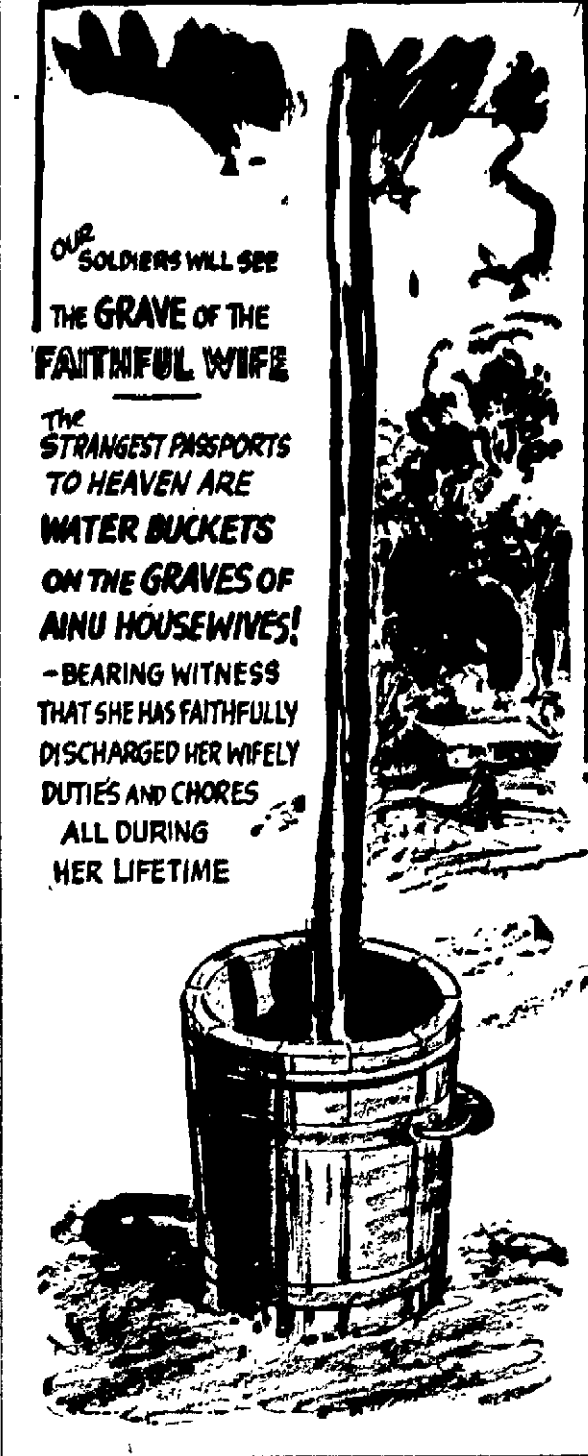
Ft. Loramie Host To Knights June 1

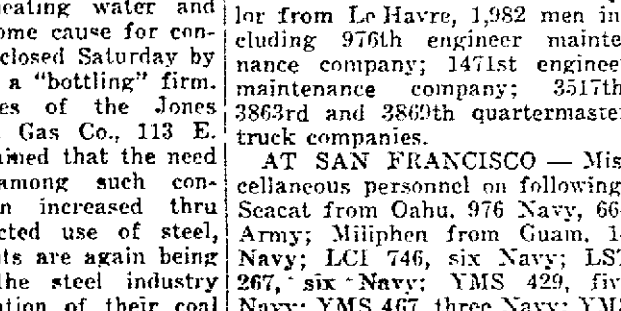

Italians Face Slash in Bread

ROME, Apr. 13—(AP)—The government, faced with the prospect of further reducing Italy's seven-ounce daily bread ration, is awaiting Washington's decision Tuesday on how much wheat is to be shipped to Italy this month.

Both the Italian food ministry and UNRRA officials reported the situation was grave, since Italians now are getting most of their 1,500 calories from bread.

Italy has been able to maintain a 200-gram daily bread ration and two kilograms of spaghetti or rice monthly with receipt of 250,000 tons of wheat on the average monthly from UNRRA since the first of the year.

Payroll Clerk Swallows Pencil

OAKLAND, Calif., Apr. 13—(AP)—A pretty payroll clerk at the Western Union office, 21-year-old Winifred Cooper, swallowed a 4-inch pencil yesterday.

"I had it in my mouth, and all of a sudden I just gulped and swallowed," said she today. "I gagged a bit, but it went down."

At Berkeley hospital, X-rays and fluoroscope pictures showed the pencil currently is resting broadside in her stomach, complete with eraser.

Doctors sent her home, with diet instructions and orders to come back for periodic checkup. They said they couldn't determine yet whether an operation will be necessary.

Akron Youth Faces Life Imprisonment

CANTON, Apr. 13—(AP)—Willie Lowder, one of three Canton McKinley high school students charged with slaying William A. Karam, 54-year-old local confectioner, last Oct. 14, today faced life imprisonment after being found guilty of first degree murder with a recommendation of mercy, which makes the life sentence mandatory.

A similar verdict was issued by another jury a week ago in the trial of John Haley, 15, for the slaying of Karam during an attempted robbery of his store.

Alfred Parkes, 16-year-old pupil also charged with first degree murder in the slaying, will be tried next week.

STRIKE CURBS 'BOTTLED GAS'

Coal-Steel Shortages Limit Containers, Dealer Says

While consumers of natural gas need not be too concerned over the effect of the soft coal strike on their fuel supply, rural and domestic users of bottled gas for cooking and heating water and cooking have some cause for concern, it was disclosed Saturday by a proprietor of a "bottling" firm.

Richard Jones of the Jones Propane Bottle Gas Co., 113 E. Sprague, explained that the need for cylinders among such concerns had been increased thru wartime restricted use of steel, and replacements are again being curtailed by the steel industry thru the limitation of their coal supplies.

Jones said that 100 cylinders ordered in December were months late in arriving, and that 400 ordered for February and April had not been received and probably wouldn't be.

These cylinders, he explained, are used primarily for cooking and water heating purposes in rural homes. The supply of the gas itself, a byproduct of oil, has not been curtailed.

The war set the company approximately 1,000 cylinders behind, he continued, and many are needed both for additional customers and to replace deteriorating equipment. The cylinders can be re-used, he explained, but new ones can't be obtained to replace those that become useless.

Other companies in the same line of work include the Liquefied Gas Co. of Ohio, 209 S. Union-st., Peoples Gas Service, 525 S. Central-av, and Pyro Fax Gas Service, Lafayette.
