## Live Stock

WEEKLY LIVE STOCK REVIEW CHICAGO, April 20 —0.9— Live stock: All classes and weights of hogs stock: All classes and weights of hogs ruled steady with receipts seasonally lighter than last week. Prices remained at the roof, with \$14.85 for virtually all barrows and gitts and \$14.10 for sows and stags.

Fed steers and yearlings, ruled steady to strong, showing very little change. Eastern order buyers took 74 per cent of receipts. Heiters were firm and cows weak on good beef offerings, but steady to 25 cents higher on cutters and other beef cows. Cow trade was very irrogular. Beef firm and cows weak on good beet offerings, but steady to 25 cents higher on cutters and other beef cows. Cow trade was very irregular. Beef bulls were. 25 cents lower, with sausage offerings steady to weak. Good and choice, vealers held firm but all others weakened at \$13.00 down. Strictly good and choice vealers sold for \$16.00 to \$17.00. Bull receipts were moderate and vealers in scant supply: top steers with weight paid \$18; best yearlings, grading choice to prime. \$17.75: 98 lb, helfer yearlings \$17.50; low-good to average-choice light steers and yearlings predominated at \$15.50-\$17.50 with a moderate supply at \$17.65-\$17.85. Helfers bulked in lond lots at \$15.50-\$17.40. Most beef cows paid \$10.50-13.00. The market was usually slow at \$13.50 upward. Fed Nebraskas scaling 1030 lbs. went in load lots to \$15.00; these were young, strictly good cows. Canners and cutters closed at \$9.00 down. The practical top for heavy beef bulls was \$14.75. but big dressing specialties reached \$15.25. Dairybreds were \$14.25 down, mostly \$13.75 down. Stock cattle were strong at \$14.75-16.50, about 1,-900 head going back.

Slaughter lambs suffered the first price set-back of any consequence in nearly four weeks. Good and choice lambs were 15-25 cents lower, but the bottom dropped out of the plainer grades with trade closing 75 cents to \$1.00 lower. Other slaughter classes, extremely scarce, were steady. Good and choice fed wooled western lambs were \$16.75-17.10, with \$18.85 the late top. Medium to good lambs bulked late at \$15.00-15.75, nilhough some early saies were up to \$16.50 and better. Common shorn aged western bucks were \$5.25.
