

## UN SECRETARY CLAIMS LITTLE CHANCE OF WAR

Lie Says Fascist, Nazi Ideas Still Exist in World

WASHINGTON, Apr. 20—(INS)—Trygve Lie, secretary general of the United Nations, said tonight there is little danger of an immediate war, but he warned that Fascist and Nazi ideas, garbed in new clothes, still exist in the world.

He added that if the United Nations fails to give the peoples of the world a "square deal," war will come in the future.

Lie, who spoke before the American Society of Newspaper Editors, emphasized that agreement between the big powers is vital to maintain peace and that the agreement itself is more important than what is agreed upon.

He said that the disagreements within the UN security council "should not be taken too seriously" because if there were no conflicting ideas there would be no need of the United Nations. He pointed out the council provides the world with a forum where "disputes can be ventilated in public."

Lie said that the small nations of Europe when they heard of meetings of the big powers at Tehran or at Yalta asked first if agreement was reached and second what was agreed upon. He added:

"We knew that agreement was necessary to win the war. The success of the security council in its work will depend upon the common will to find agreement between both the small and the greater powers and especially between the great powers. We must strive always for agreement."

Lie, quoting Maxim Litvinoff that "peace is indivisible," said it will be the aim of the UN to prevent "adventurous statesmen from indulging in the idea that one little war won't hurt anybody."

But, he said, both fascism and nazism were inimical to peace and those ideas, "dressed in new clothing," exist in many countries and are still a threat to peace. Lie added:

"Yet the forces in favor of peace today are so powerful that I personally cannot believe that the world will see another war in the period immediately ahead of us."

However, he pointed out that the goal of the UN is to prevent all future wars and he quoted President Truman's speech to the Pan-American union that economic ills are the root of war. He said:

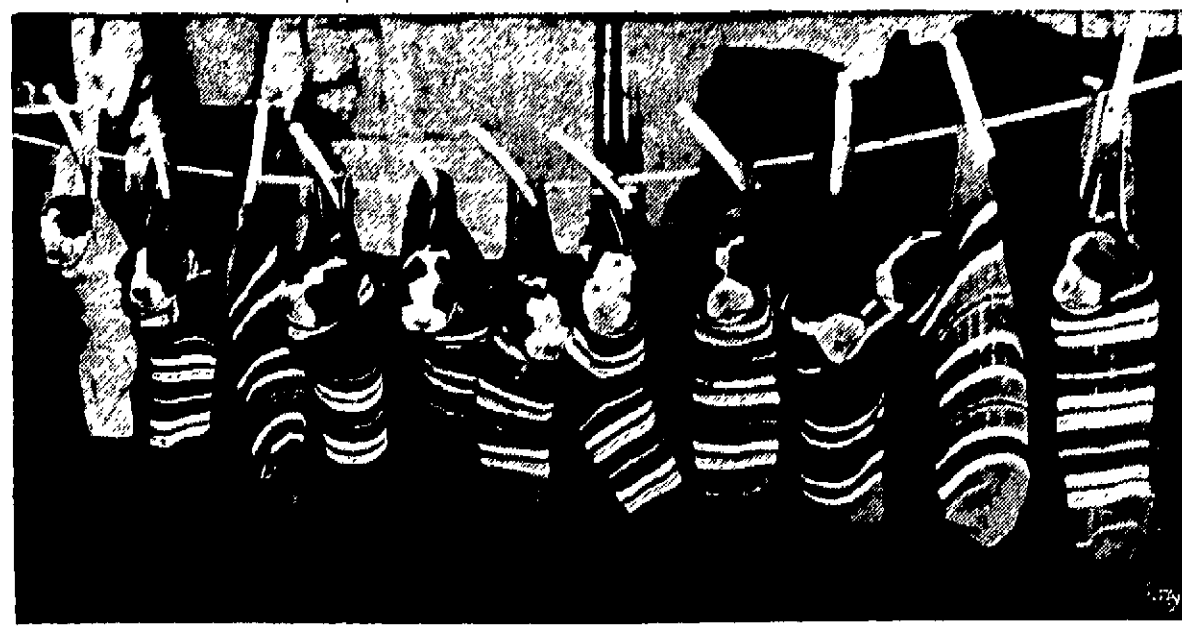
"We feel that unless we can make a real go of our positive work, to improve economic and social conditions by international cooperation over a long period of years, we shall fail to prevent war."

He added: "We recognize that there will never be true peace in this world as long as millions of our fellow human beings are deprived of the right to develop freely and progressively toward well-being and self-government. The germ of liberty lies in every human heart and as long as liberty is lacking there will be fuels for future conflicts."

Lie declared that U. S. citizens do not realize how the world looks to this country for leadership or what an enormous inspiration the late President Franklin D. Roosevelt was to the rest of the world.

## 4 Democrats, 2 Republicans Seek Post as Ohio's Attorney General

EDITORS NOTE: This is the fifth in a series of articles about candidates at the May 5 primary elections for nominations for state offices, U. S. senator, governor, attorney general and supreme court judges.

COLUMBUS, Apr. 20—(UP)—Two Republicans and four Democrats seek nominations May 7 on their party's tickets for attorney general, the state's chief legal officer.

Atty. Gen. Hugh S. Jenkins, Youngstown, who is seeking reelection for his second term, is opposed for the Republican nomination by Harry T. Marshall, Cleveland city councilman, who was an unsuccessful contender for the nomination in 1944.

The four candidates for nomination on the Democratic ticket are:

George A. Hurley, Cleveland, unsuccessful nominee in 1944; Timothy S. Rogan, Cincinnati, recently a lieutenant colonel in the Army air forces; Everett L. Foote, Akron, former Portage-co. prosecutor, and Reed Winegardner, Washington C. H., former assistant attorney general.

Terms of the office of attorney general is two years, commencing Jan. 13, 1947, and ending on the second Monday in January, 1949. Salary is \$6,500 a year.

The attorney general is chief legal officer of the state. He is the legal advisor for the state's elective officials and the various departments, bureaus and commissions and represents them in all official business and litigation.

## COURT MARTIAL REPORT DENIED

Military Chiefs Challenge 'Incorrect Statement'

WASHINGTON, Apr. 20—(INS)—Under Secretary of War Kenneth C. Royall today branded as full of "incorrect statements" and "unjustified criticism" a 25,000-word report by a house military affairs subcommittee disclosing execution of 142 men since Pearl Harbor following army courts martial.

The report, approved by the subcommittee, of which Rep. Durham (D-N.C.) is chairman, is still in the hands of the full committee. Durham said that final action by the full group had been delayed until after the Easter recess of the house to permit Royall to testify.

The subcommittee report was drafted after a lengthy investigation which was initiated six months ago because, declared a military affairs committee statement, "so many complaints have come to members of congress of injustices in connections with courts martial."

It is highly critical of the army's system of justice, terming it full of "abuses," with different sentences dispensed for commissioned officers and GIs.

Members of courts martial, it stated, "are largely amateurs, from the legal point of view, although they may pass on questions of life and death."

The report stated that the 142 death sentences were carried out between Dec. 7, 1941 and Feb. 22, 1945. They included 72 for murder, 51 for rape, 18 for murder and rape, and one for desertion.

The report hit at the severity of some sentences, many of which it termed unwarranted. It stated:

"Abuses have existed and wrongs have been committed in such numbers as to excite widespread comment both inside and outside the army. Even high-ranking officers of the judge advocate general's department have been known to speak, in private, of course, of the 'break-down' of military justice."

Royall said that the War department was "anxious that full consideration be given all possible improvements in the system of military justice."

The subcommittee recommended overhauling of the army's system of justice, including appointment by the President of a judge advocate general completely divorced from the armed services.

It urged that the army establish an autonomous judicial department with qualified personnel to serve as members of courts martial and as defense counsel.

A table of maximum punishments should be established for all offenses, it added, and should apply equally to officers and enlisted men. Open trials also were proposed.
