

'Miss Susie Slagle's' Opens At State Theatre Thursday

"Miss Susie Slagle's" is the kind of picture that film goers haven't seen in a long time, but are going to get a chance to do so now when the film begins a run at the State theatre Thursday.

With Sonny Tufts, Veronica Lake and newcomer Joan Caulfield, the film also brings a popular veteran actress back to the screen—Lillian Gish who plays the proprietress of a boarding house for young medical students. Looking At HOLLYWOOD with ERSKINE JOHNSON

HOLLYWOOD, Apr. 24—(NEA)—Sterling Hayden, the tall, blond seafaring man who became a star in two movies with absolutely no previous acting experience, married his co-star, Madeleine Carroll, and then went back to the sea because he "hated" pictures, is back in Hollywood with a new outlook on life and a new "e" in his name, but without his bride.

You've read how they were divorced in Reno on Hayden's way back to Hollywood after he had served in the merchant marine, and as a captain in the Marine Corps, using the name of John Hamilton because he didn't want a Hollywood career mixed up with his fighting activities.

But the new "e" in his name was a new one on this department.

When Producer Edward H. Griffith discovered him in 1940 in Boston, between sailing schedules, his name was Sterling Hayden. When Paramount signed him to a film contract, Griffith suggested changing the spelling to "Stirling" which is the way it later appeared on the screen.

A few months ago, when Paramount re-signed him in New York, the agents drawing up the contract asked: "What shall it be an 'e' or an 'i'?" "Make it an 'e'," Sterling said. So that's the way it will be in the future.

"I also thought of having a clause in the contract that Paramount would provide me with a place to live," Hayden chuckled. "I had heard about the housing shortage. But Bert Allenberg, my agent, talked me out of it. I'm getting more money than I did before.

As it is, Hayden is living in a house Paramount bought for out-of-town visitors who can't find hotel rooms. Then he'll probably buy a boat and live on it between pictures, at Balboa Bay.

Hayden says he doesn't hate the movies anymore. "When I was here before I saw a chance to make a lot of money quick, buy a big schooner, and spend the rest of my life sailing," he told us. "The war changed my mind. You can't just run away from everything."

A Real Sailor

We're not kidding when we refer to Hayden as a sea-faring man. He's sailed ships all his life, ever since he was a kid living in the Maine seacoast town of Boothbay Harbor. He was navigator aboard the famed Gloucester schooner Gertrude L. Thebaud when it raced the Bluenose in the International Fishermen's Race. As master of the schooner Yankee, he cruised around the world.

Paramount gave him a 128-foot schooner, which he sold just before the war, as a bonus for his work in "Bahama Passage," his last film before going back to sea. He made his film debut in "Virginia."

Naturally, Hollywood's fancy yachts give him a chuckle. He refers to them as "seven-deckers with straw bottoms."

Hollywood hasn't changed much since he went away, he says. "The girls are just as beautiful. They're the most beautiful girls in the world."

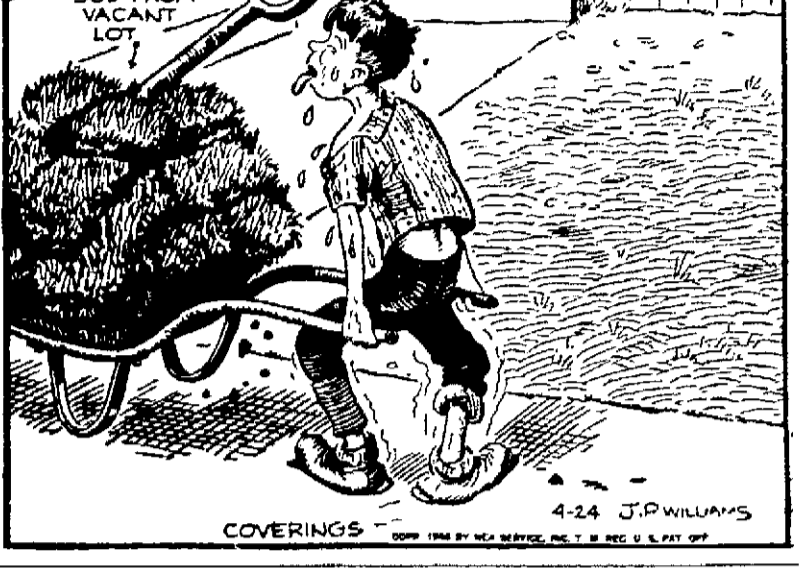
