

STATES FEUD OVER STANDING ON FOLK SONGS

Tennessee and Kentucky Officials Both Claim Distinction for Their State

WASHINGTON, May 2—(UP)—Thar's ballads in them thar Kentucky mountains.

In fact, there are more ballads and hill billy music in the Kentucky than in the Tennessee mountains, according to Mark Ethridge of Louisville—Kentucky.

Ethridge, newspaper publisher and manager of Radio Station WHAS, remarked to the Federal Communications Commission that Tennessee has been doing too much unwarranted boasting about being the No. 1 state in old folk songs. Kentucky is getting tired of this.

"Kentucky's mountains, not Tennessee's, really contain the gold mines of ancient English ballads and native folk—or if you prefer, hill billy music," he said.

Tennessee had a willing champion in the controversy, however. Rep. J. Peay Pijest, D., Tenn., said Ethridge had been misinformed. Priest offered to take Ethridge on a tour of the mountains of both states to prove that Tennessee "really is the conservatory of most of the early folk songs and ballads."

"We could go thru the Cumberland and Smoky Mountains in Tennessee and then over into Kentucky," Priest said.

"After such a trip, Mr. Ethridge being the fair-minded man I know him to be, undoubtedly would agree that Tennessee—and not Kentucky—is the real resting place of the early ballads and old folk songs."

There the argument rested, because the nation's outstanding authority on ballads said it would be impossible to decide the issue. He is Duncan Emrich, chief of the congressional library's archive of American folk songs.

Both states are very rich in old folk songs, Emrich said with statesmanlike impartiality.

"The only way to decide which is the greater in ballads," Emrich said, "would be to line up the entire populations of the two states facing each other, and start them singing."

Emrich's collectors take equipment into the mountains and rural sections of the nation to record old songs. They have recorded about 1,000 in Kentucky and half that number in Tennessee.

However, these figures do not prove anything, Emrich added. Most of the songs are sung widely in both states and there are many factors in determining where the recordings are made.

Ethridge vigorously defended the esthetic claims for hill billy music—whether it is played in Kentucky or Tennessee.

"A great many people seem to think," he said, "that symphonic music is really the music of the American people. As a former director of two symphony boards, I am inclined to doubt that."

So, be proud of your musical tastes if The Great Speckled Bird or "Butcher Boy" is your favorite tune.
