

# Life of Westinghouse Dramatized on Sunday

The life story of George Westinghouse, inventor of countless electrical gadgets and founder of the great Westinghouse Electric Corp. will be dramatized at 9 p. m. Sunday over MBS on the "Freedom of Opportunity" program.

The dramatization will trace his triumphs as an inventor and as the founder of one of the nation's largest electrical manufacturing companies, which is celebrating its centennial anniversary this week. Charlie McCarthy is on his good behavior while awaiting a visit from Ethel Barrymore, the distinguished "First Lady of the Theatre," at 7 p. m. Sunday over NBS. Charlie shares program honors with Edgar Bergen, Ray Noble and Anita Gordon.

Ralph Bellamy, star of the Pulitzer prize play, "State of the Union," will play the leading role, when "Exploring the Unknown," presents a dramatic forecast of "A Rocket to the Moon," in the broadcast at 8 p. m. Sunday over MBS.

## House Painted in 5 Minutes

MARION, Ill., May 18—(AP)—Thirty-eight men painted a Marion home in 5 minutes, 24.2 seconds today as a crowd of about 3,000 cheered them on.

The painters, including one with one arm, aimed at a time of three minutes flat based on an expected team of 50 men. They withheld claims of a world's record pending measurement of the five-room house.

U. A. Roberts, painter-in-charge, said the Albert Turner house was selected for the swift brush-off after an ailment forced Turner to retire as a painter.

A brush-by-brush broadcast by a Station WJPF announcer credited the painters with "hitting every spot"—including splattering the announcer's suit as he got too close to operations.

"I think they did a grand job," praised Mrs. Turner.

## Police Seize Prison Escapee

CHARLESTON, W. Va., May 18—(AP)—The arrest of a twice-convicted prisoner who escaped from the Moundsville State penitentiary and later allegedly seriously wounded a soldier in New York was announced today by State Police Supt. W. E. Burchett.

Burchett said Otto Neff, 35, of Parkersburg, was arrested Wednesday night by officers seeking goods taken in a store theft near Grantsville, but was not identified until last night.

Nassau-co. N. Y. officers have issued a warrant, Burchett said, charging Neff with felonious assault in the serious wounding of Charles Novak in a Nassau-co. tavern on Feb. 13.

## 54TH YEAR COMPLETED AS OPERATOR OF STORE

MINSTER, May 18—Believed the oldest retail store operator in the area if not in the state, Mrs. Henry Gast of Chickasaw, a village of 200, seven miles northwest of here, has completed her 54th year in business.

Questions and Answers On Servicemen's Problems

WASHINGTON, May 18—(NEA)—Here are some questions from veterans regarding surplus property:

Q—More than a month ago, I placed my order for a large quantity of surplus cotton goods. I had to go thru a lot of red tape and trouble even to get my order placed. Since then I have heard that if I do get any of the cotton I ordered, I will only get a small fraction of what I asked for. What can you tell me about this?

A—The War Assets Administration reports that veterans who ordered surplus cotton textiles will receive the full amounts ordered, in the majority of cases.

Due to the unusually large number of orders received, much time was taken in screening the orders, to meet the requirements of Civilian Production Administration and to carry out the terms of the Surplus Property Act.

Q—Before the law was changed to let veterans buy surplus property with a second preference, I placed my order for several items which I had intended to use in my business. Since then I have not changed my plans, and I am not going into business. But I still would like to have the property I ordered. Now that the law has been changed, may I put what I buy into personal use?

A—Orders for surplus property to be used in a business are filled before orders for personal use. If your order claims you will use the goods for a business, and you then put them into personal use, you will have purchased the property under a fraudulent claim.

Q—Are orders that were placed before the surplus property law was changed going to get the new preference, or do they have to be placed again?

A—Old orders do not have to be filed again to qualify for the new preference given to veterans.

Q—Is a former WAC eligible to buy surplus property with a preference, and for personal use?

A—Yes.

Q—When I got out of service a year ago, I took an apprentice training program and passed it. I am now a qualified journeyman. But the company officials say they are going to lay me off because of strikes in a related industry. Can they do this to me? I thought they had to guarantee me a job for a year.

A—They can do it to you, all right. There is no guarantee of a job after the completion of an apprentice training program.
