OPA Lists Settlements of Violations

MILWAUKEE (U.P.)—The Milwaukee district Office of Price Administration (OPA) Saturday announced in its weekly enforcement roundup that violators of OPA regulations have made settlements involving several thousands of dollars.
 Consent injunctions were arranged with the following firms along with settlements:
 Circular Bar, Middleton, \$600; Dobby's Cosmo club, Menasha, \$692; Pierce's hotel and restaurant, Baraboo, \$100; Camel's tavern, Madison, \$750; Belin Garment Company, Inc., Milwaukee, \$4,339.
 Concerns against whom the OPA started suit and the amounts demanded were:
 Blackhawk Hotel, Beloit, injunction and \$3,096; Estelle Kingdom, Beloit, injunction and \$252; Sheridan market, Waterloo, injunction on complaint slaughtered live stock without getting required quota; A. J. Schroedl, Route 2, Jefferson, injunction asked on complaint received or stored ungraded meat.
 Additional settlement for alleged overpricing prices included Molly American bar, Racine, \$281; Hotel Foeste, Sheboygan, \$405; Stevens' grocery, Beloit, \$100; H. L. Johnson, Madison, \$184 settlement, \$79 refund; Francine's, Baraboo, \$136, and Krause's grocery, Madison, \$50.

Churchill Raps British Policy

Wary of Using Palestine as Base

LONDON (U.P.)—Winston Churchill told commons Friday that British use of Palestine as a military base for defense of the Suez canal would prejudice seriously Britain's hope of "gaining the aid of the United States on the Palestine question."
 Churchill gave enthusiastic approval to the recommendations of the Anglo-American commission on Palestine, but said the task of carrying out the recommendations was "too much to put on Britain single-handed."
 Commons debate on Egypt branched off into the Palestine issue when Churchill spoke of the relation between the two matters.
 As leader of the opposition in parliament, Churchill attacked the government's policy in Egypt. He said it was essential to maintain British forces in the area of the Suez canal to protect it, but they should have been withdrawn from Cairo and Alexandria months ago.
 He said he was "most hopeful" that the report of the Anglo-American commission would lead to cooperation between the two countries.

New Navy Secret 'Weapon' Believed Controlled Germ

WASHINGTON (U.P.)—The secret weapon developed during the war by the navy Friday was believed to be a controlled disease that through the centuries has been one of the world's greatest killers.
 Rep. Albert Thomas, (D-Tex.), told the house Thursday that the navy had developed "something far more deadly than the atomic bomb." He declined to elaborate except to say the weapon was developed by the navy's bureau of medicine and surgery.

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Immell Says State Lags in Progress

RACINE (U.P.)—Wisconsin has been dragging its feet in the progress parade, Maj. Gen. Ralph M. Immell charged here, Thursday night in his campaign for the Republican nomination for governor.
 The state has fallen out of step in programs where it formerly led the nation, Immell told the Racine Progressive Republican assn.
 He charged that the state now has no overall plan for highways, that its conservation program is declining and its soil wasting away. Wisconsin's education program has dropped to 32nd place among the states, he added. Immell referred to himself as a crusader to make Christian democracy work.
 He warned that after a period of prosperity there will be a decisive engagement between our way of life and the Soviet system of government and economy and urged that every voice be raised in support of the American way.

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
