**Philippines Revamps Relief**

MANILA, June 4—(AP)—Tackling its major problems, famine and internal warfare, the new Philippines administration today inaugurated a major shakeup in the rehabilitation organization and announced that 11,000 Huk-balahap guerrillas had promised to hand in their guns before July 4.

Jose Zulueta, new secretary of the interior, said if the arms were surrendered the Central Luzon agrarian problem could be settled without further bloodshed.

President Manuel A. Roxas, holding the first of a promised series of weekly news conferences, said he feared the most serious food shortages would begin in August and would start a national campaign to raise substitutes for rice. Rationing of rice is not contemplated because there is not enough to ration, he said.

The Veterans Administration's \$448,000,000 hospital construction plan will require 70,000 "man-years" of on-the-job labor by building tradesmen.

**Divorce Rate Twice Normal**

PRINCETON, N. J., June 4—(AP)—The number of divorces in the United States today is about twice normal and 40 per cent as large as the number of marriages.

Dr. Paul C. Glick of the U. S. Bureau of Census told the concluding session of the 12th annual meeting of the Population Association of America today.

The peak, he said, is yet to come in 1947, following which the divorce rate will drop sharply, "so by 1950, the rate will be back to normal of about 300,000 divorces a year."

Dr. Glick said the marriage volume also is "soaring to new heights."

"In the last quarter of 1945 and the first quarter of 1946, the number of marriages, probably, surpassed any other six months on record," he said.
