CHICAGO LIVE STOCK

CHICAGO, June 8 (AP)—The cattle market was very active all week with fed steers and yearlings strong to 25c, mostly 25c higher on medium, good and choice grades. Steers graded high on common, medium and low-grade kinds. Choice steers topped at the \$38.00 ceiling, most at \$17.50-20.00 with average gain for the week at an all-time high. Few heifers and cows and bulk were 25c or more higher; good and choice grades were steady; beef bulk reached \$15.75, heavy dairy-bred \$14.50 with medium weight and weights sausage bulk \$12.50-14.00. With average gain for the week at \$13.50 down, other grades 25-50c lower at \$13.50 down, stock cattle scarce, firm, most \$12.50-15.75 with choice yearlings \$17.50.

Hog receipts for the five day period totaled about 25,000 and all weights and classes were steady at ceilings with no marked changes in any branches. Sows and stage brought the \$14.00 ceiling but there was no increase in the group in any branch, although the summer movement is reported upward in other sections.

Sheep market was active, fed lambs were strong to 25c higher, spring lambs scarce, mostly steady with spots 25c up. Slaughter ewes were about steady about a week higher, underdeveloped lambs. Bulk clipped lambs topped at \$17.40 with most No. 1 and No. 2 pairs \$15.00-17.15; the top was the highest in many years for short lambs. Most good and choice native springers at \$17.50; short lambs, most 2000 and choice native springers at \$17.50-18.75.
