Lausche Maps Gambling Fight

COLUMBUS, June 8—(AP)—Stung by "private information" that 200 slot machines were busy at Brady Lake last night even though he had suspended the mayor of the Portage-co village, Gov. Frank J. Lausche planned today to try to get injunctions against the operators.

The governor told his press conference that while a civil action would not be so effective as criminal prosecution, he had asked Atty. Gen. Hugh S. Jenkins to check the law for definite procedure.

"It is shocking to believe such brazenness and defiance is exhibited by lawless people against government and its enforcement officials," Gov. Lausche told his press conference.

"If local authorities would merely show a desire to clean up the situation, it could be done."

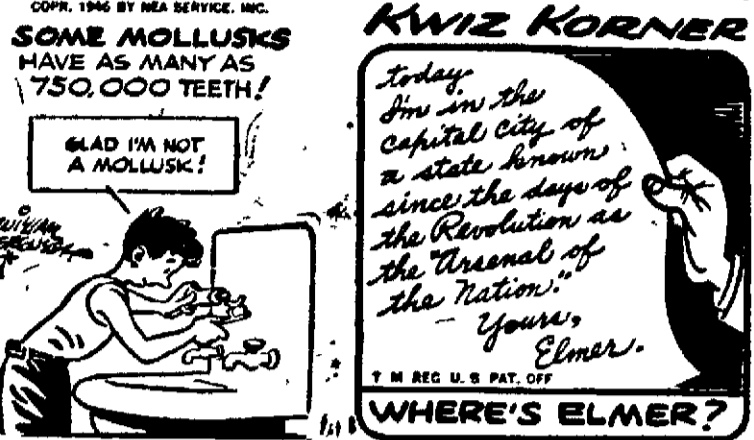
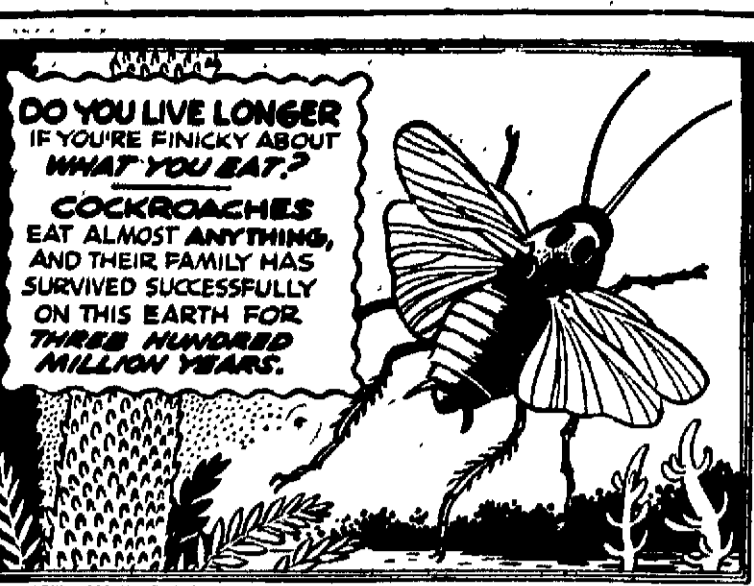

Sailor's Act Brings Good Cry

NEW YORK, June 8—(UP)—A Navy veteran, a jeweler's wife and a policeman had a good cry today because the ex-sailor thought it was about time his wristwatch was repaired properly.

The weeping started, police said, when Charles Elliott Prival, 24, of Philadelphia, took a vial of tear gas from his pocket, threw it on the floor of the Arcade Watch Shop and stepped on it.

He began to cry. So did Mrs. Anna Shayne, Brooklyn, wife of the proprietor. Their tears brought Patrolman Charles Haecker, he cried, too.

Police said the pre-weeping argument involved Prival's demand for the use of another watch until his was properly repaired and Mrs. Shayne's plea that she could do nothing about it as her husband was out of town.

All three were treated by an ambulance attendant and Prival, whose wife said he was a former lieutenant and veteran of the Admiralty Islands campaign, was charged with felonious assault and illegal possession of tear gas.

Army Planning Arctic Tests

WASHINGTON, June 8—(AP)—The Army underscored its interest in the Arctic short route between Europe and America today with an announcement that special task forces will make new tests in Alaska and the Aleutians this winter of tactics, weapons and equipment for subzero weather.

Some 4,500 ground troops, who will begin assembling next month, will test tanks, self-propelled guns, radar, clothing and other items of military gear "under all possible winter combat conditions."

The Air Forces disclosed earlier that a squadron of converted B-29 long range-bombers has been assigned to Alaska to make frequent weather flights over the Arctic, termed by ranking military men the world's most strategic stretch of geography in the age of atom bombs and 10,000-mile planes.
