

Adventure Film 'Tangier' Offers New Maria Montez

Lima's showhouses Saturday were offering a variety in film entertainment promising a week-end packed with romance and comedy, with mystery and the west to be predominant in screen stories here.

The man-woman adventure you've all been waiting to see is "Tangier," which opens Saturday at the Sigma theatre, bringing to the screen a new Maria Montez. Starring Robert Paige and Sabu, the action-packed picture deals with a dancer's death hunt for her hated enemy, a character known as Balizar.

In her search for Balizar, the dancer (Maria) meets an American newspaper reporter, and both find romance as well as the mysterious Balizar. Sharing the billing is "The Seventh Veil," a drama with Ann Todd and James Mason.

The story of an outlaw horse and an untamed girl both comes to the celluloid in the form of "Smoky," a technicolor film of today's West. Hardly a "Western" in the sense of the Hollywood meaning of the word, the film has Fred MacMurray, Anne Baxter and Burl Ives, the new singing troubadour. The picture is at the Quilna theatre.

A madcap romance-comedy of an author on a train, the two Marines she encounters and their adventures in a dining car are rolled into five week-end treat for fans of Claudette Colbert, John Wayne and Don DeFore. "Without Reservations" is playing at the Ohio theatre.

Wallace Beery comes to the screen at his best, supported by Hollywood's best little star, Margaret O'Brien, in "Bad Bascomb," a tale of the wild west at the State theatre. "Blonde Alibi" is the other feature.

Midnight Saturday will change the billing at the Lyric theatre to "Swing Parade of 1946" and "Get Along Little Doggie" with Gene Autry.

The Majestic theatre now is showing "Back to Bataan," a story of the war, and "That's the Spirit," "Naughty Marietta" and "Patric the Great" are due Sunday.

"Flight Lieutenant" with Pat O'Brien, plus "Ranger Code" will close Saturday evening at the Allen theatre to bring "Docks of New York" and "Young Bill Hickock."

"Silver Spurs" and "Dancing in Manhattan" will begin Sunday at the Lima Drive-In theatre. The Gloria Drive-In theatre now has "Those Endearing Young Charms" with Loraine Day. "She Wouldn't Say Yes" is due Sunday.

Merchants Told To Keep Records

CINCINNATI, July 6—(INS)—All manufacturers, wholesalers, retailers and all others who have been required to keep records under price control must preserve their records until July 1, 1947, the Cincinnati district Office of Price Administration warned today.

The executive order signed by President Truman on June 30 provided that OPA would continue all the functions invested in it by the emergency price control act of 1942 and the stabilization act of 1942 that did not terminate with the expiration of the acts on June 30.

OPA officials explained that this order assures that all records, books, accounts, invoices, sales lists, receipts, etc., are required to be kept in keeping with its continued enforcement duties for violations committed before June 30.

Former State Official Dies

COLUMBUS, July 6—(AP)—Wellington T. Leonard, onetime newspaper man and an active state government official for two decades, died yesterday of bronchial pneumonia. He was 68.

An original member and second chairman of the State Board of Liquor Control, Leonard also was a former chairman of the State Industrial Commission.

After serving in the Spanish-American War, he went to Cleveland to serve on the staffs of The Leader and Plain Dealer. Later he became editor and part owner of The Mansfield Shield where he gave Louis Bromfield, present-day popular novelist, his first writing job.

Gov. Vic Donahey appointed "Duke" Leonard to the State Industrial Commission in 1927 and two years later he became chairman. He served under Governors George White and Martin L. Davey on the state liquor board.

DAYTON, July 6—(INS)—Two men were dead and a woman in serious condition in Dayton today following what officers said was a love-triangle shooting.

The dead were Anthony Lacey, 52, and Alvin Robinson, 63.
