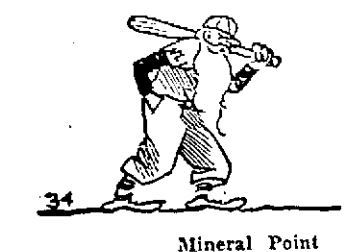
With that new driving crusade on 35 miles an hour are the boys ever looking in the mirror for squad cars. They are coming up town slower than an Arkansas mule.

There are two rules which help cover the situation described above. Rule 22 states the ball is dead and not in play in case of foul hit not legally caught. The ball shall not be considered in play until it is held by the pitcher standing in his position and the umpire shall have called "play".

The other rule which makes it very plain is Rule 48 which states the baserunner shall return to his base without liability to be put out; if the umpire declares the ball is legally caught. If any foul not called "play" before the runner returned to first he made a mistake. If he did not call "play" the ball was dead. However, even if he did call "play" the runner returning to first could not be put out.

Detroit Gets National Rowing Races in 1947

PHILADELPHIA (U.P.)—The 1947 national rowing championships will be held on the Detroit river next July 18-19, the National Association of Amateur Oarsmen announced today.

The association, at its annual meeting here Friday night, awarded the regatta to the Detroit Boat Club, accepting the bid made by Thomas E. Lane, former president of the club. Bids also had been received from New York and Philadelphia.

Dr. George N. List of the Colorado A. and M. college experiment station says the strikes have shot off the supply of raw arsenic, the "kick" in many commercial insecticides. Containers for the anti-bug juice also are short and pose a threat to the late 1948 supply, he said.
