

MITSUI FAMILY VOTES EMPIRE DISSOLUTION

Gen. MacArthur Awaits Official Notification of New Program

TOKYO, July 20.—The House of Mitsui family council today announced dissolution of the powerful family organization which once controlled the greatest industrial empire in Japan.

But whether the organizational change will affect family holdings remained questionable and Gen. MacArthur's headquarters said it had not yet received official notification of the plan.

The family council, headed by Baron Takakimi Mitsui, included the heads of 11 related families who have lived according to dictates of an ancestral will written in 1722.

These councilors ruled the family holding company which controlled an industrial empire valued at more than 7,000,000,000 yen, almost \$2,000,000,000 by pre-war figures.

The sketchy announcement of the council dissolution did not reveal whether members of the 11 families will surrender their holdings.

Last December, Gen. MacArthur ordered dissolution of the family combine. It was believed MacArthur's headquarters would study the Mitsui dissolution plan for the possibility of tax evasion attempts and whether it would meet MacArthur's directives.

The powerful house of Mitsui was established in 1632 by Sukubei Mitsui, a clan chief warrior who quit fighting to brew sake.

The family entered the loan, then the drygoods business, growing so wealthy that one family head left a will which prescribed rules of marriage, education and distribution of fortunes among members of 11 family branches.

The will banned marriages outside the family group without permission of the family council. The edict also outlined a program to encourage cultural development of the Mitsui family with special education funds.

This will was family law until the turn of the last century, when its provisions were incorporated into a formal family constitution.

Duke Ellington will be guest bandleader on the Tommy Dorsey Show at 7:30 p. m. Sunday over NBC. The Duke's visit brings together two of the country's foremost musicians—trombonist Dorsey and pianist Ellington.

Holy See Urges Solons Share Experiences

VATICAN CITY, July 20.—(AP)—Pope Pius urged a group of American senators and representatives whom he received today in private audience to share the experiences acquired on their around the world journey, so that men will understand more fully "the havoc wrought by war and the tremendous difficulty of reconstruction."

The pope spoke in English. He told his listeners that the spectacles of shattered landscapes that they had seen and the havoc in the lives of men should not be "locked away in idle memory."

"Truly pitiless," said the pontiff, "is the physical condition of multitudes today, more pitiless by far, the spiritual."

Thousands, he said, craved the consolations of religion, and "in many lands find it difficult to secure them."

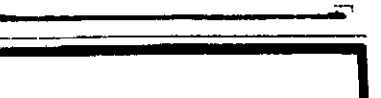

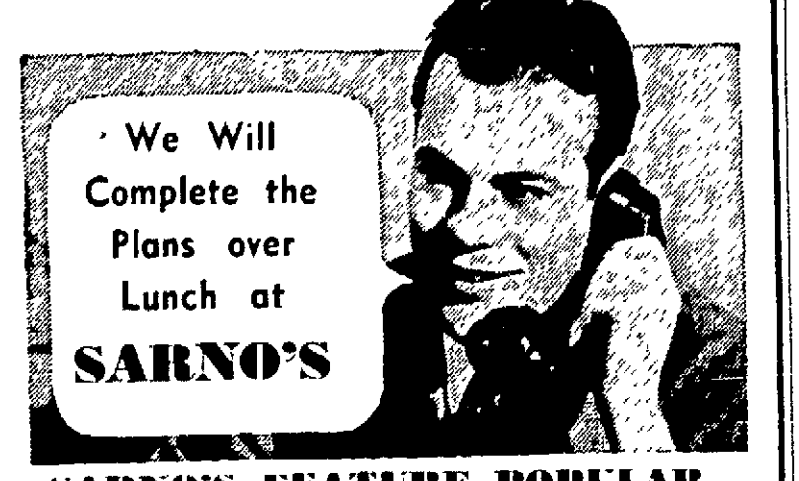
