

Top Actors and Lusty Plot On Tap at Lyric Tuesday

A scintillating cast of top-notch performers plus a lusty plot of romantic dilemmas forms the basis for a perfect gem of escapist entertainment, "Casanova Brown," which opens Tuesday at the Lyric theatre.

With Gary Cooper as "Casanova" or "Caz," the picture is merry-romance combined with a bit of humorous mystery, resulting in a triple problem for the "Mr. Brown." Teresa Wright plays the feminine lead, supported by Anita Louise and Frank Morgan. "Laura" with Gene Tierney and Dana Andrews is the second attraction.

Few pictures have carried the heat-warming appeal of "So Goes My Love" now playing at the Sigma theatre. With Myrna Loy and Don Ameche, it's the story of Hiram Maxim, famed inventor. Instead of dealing with devices he created, it tells the human story of a man and woman who meet by accident. Also on the billing is "Falcon's Alibi."
