Car Production only Third Of Same 7-Month Era In 1941

DETROIT, Aug. 3-(AP)-The nation's passenger automobile as- months. sembly plants so far this year have turned out slightly under 900,000 vehicles but no appreciable reduction has been made in the big backlog of demand that piled up during the war years. If you think 900,000 is a lot

of automobiles and should include the one you ordered several out new lower priced cars. months ago it would be well to remember that -The volume is less than one-

In the decade preceding the war replacement demand alone reguired slightly more than 2,380,- portions. 000 cars annually.

For three and one-half yearsfrom Feb. 10, 1942, until July 3, 1945-not a single passenger car was made for civilian use. Current production is at the rate of less than 50 per cent of

normal. Because of materials shortages thousands of vehicles are leaving the assembly lines unfinished. Some buyers are accepting deliveries without rear seat equipment but in several instances the unfinished vehicles are piling up in lots adjoining the assembly plants.
That's the dark side of the out-

look for early delivery of new passenger cars. There may be some comfort in the fact that the car industry currently has greater production capacity than ever in its history. However, because of shortages of steel, pig iron, copper, cotton goods, lead, scrap other item going into car assem-

BACKLOG bly, the industry hasn't been able to utilize its full capacity.

It may be true, as some indusbacklog of demand has been over-estimated; that it will shrink materially as car prices move up-ward and that already buyers are becoming more "selective"—more particular about color combinations and other details.

Yet, allowing for all the elements that might enter into an over-estimating of the accumulation of new car orders, the backlog is of substantial proportions, representing probably a greater volume than the industry can produce in the next year to 18

The suggestion has been ad vanced in some industry quarters that price increases in present A. M. models will influence many potential buyers to delay their purchases until the latter part of next year when most of the manufacturers are expected to bring

The sales division of the industry expects some such reaction to mounting retail price schedules third the number of cars produced for what formerly were "lowin the first seven months of 1941. priced" cars. But most of the merchandising executives are convinced it will not be of major pro-

And the industry which puts on its assembly lines only the vehicles for which it has orders, is going ahead with plans for the highest possible production volume well into next year before halting for new model switch-overs.


