

MILITARY COURT STUDIES CRAZY PLEA BY HESS

Nazi Leader Says All His Pre-Trial Predictions Have Become True

EDITOR'S NOTE: The international military tribunal at Nuremberg is studying the plea of Adolf Hitler...

NUERNBERG, Sept. 14—(INS)—One of the most amazing documents in history—Rudolph Hess' crazy and largely meaningless plea for his life—is under study by the international military tribunal of Nuremberg today.

A partial text of his outburst, which the judges vainly tried to shut off before its conclusion, follows:

"Some of my comrades can confirm that at the beginning of the proceedings I predicted the following:

"First, that witnesses under oath would make untrue statements, sometimes creating an absolutely unreliable impression."

"Second, it was to be reckoned with that the court would receive untrue affidavits."

"Third, the defendants would hear astonishing facts from a few German witnesses."

"Fourth, some defendants would act strangely, would make shameless utterances about the Fuehrer, incriminate their own people wrongly and perhaps incriminate themselves wrongly."

"All my predictions have come true."

"So far as witnesses and affidavits are concerned, defendants under oath were confronted with statements made under oath."

"I would like to mention Messersmith (George S. Messersmith, former U. S. ambassador to Germany), who knew the grand admiral (Erich Raeder) and claims to have talked to him in Berlin when the admiral was in the Indian Ocean or the Pacific, to my knowledge."

"I would like to base my predictions on some events in countries outside Germany and emphasize right here that I am convinced the governments involved did not know of these events."

"From 1936 to 1938 in one of these countries political trials were taking place, characterized by the fact that the defendants were accusing each other in an astonishing way, citing a great number of crimes which they committed or claimed to have committed."

"But it is equally significant when we look at the people who undoubtedly gave the orders for these atrocities, all the way up to the Fuehrer."

"Field Marshal (Erhard) Milch testified he had the impression that the Fuehrer in his last years was not quite normal mentally. Some of my comrades here have told me that his facial expression and his eyes contained something cruel and that he even had a tendency toward madness."

"A certain incident in England caused me to think of reports of the earlier trials. They (the defendants) acted in an inexplicable way which leads me to conclude these people were acting in a state of mind which was not quite normal."

"They had strange eyes, glassy eyes, and these had a dreamy cast. The symptoms lasted a few days and then they were completely normal."

Task Force 'Frigid' Will Invade Alaska To Test New Weapons on General Winter

By SPENCER DAVIS FORT ORD, Calif., Sept. 14—Two Army task forces are sailing to Alaska for an all-out seven months campaign against a bitterly relentless but predictable enemy—winter weather.

The Army wasn't proud of the showing its winter equipment made in the last war. Far from it. Much equipment proved definitely unsatisfactory, particularly during the "Battle of the Bulge" when vitally needed man-power was incapacitated by frostbite and trenchfoot, aides to no man's ally, General Winter.

So into sub-zero cold, whipped by sudden gusts of wind blowing up to 110 miles an hour go Task Forces Williwaw and Frigid with some 1,700 medically screened, combat-equipped troops.

At Camp McCoy, Wisconsin, a third task force—"Frost"—will be conducting simultaneous tests under conditions climatically similar to the Ardennes battle-ground of northern France. Task Force Frost will determine the degree of acclimation needed to enable troops from temperate climates to operate in arctic regions.

Williwaw Battles Winds Task Force Williwaw, named for dreaded tundra winds that freakishly develop without warning to blow violent gusts in all directions, will be based at Adak in the Aleutian Islands. Its leader is Col. William H. Wood, head football coach at West Point in the 1939-40 seasons and chief of staff of the 13th armored division during the war.

From the beginning of October until the end of April, Wood's men will subject their arctic felt shoes, cotton lined parkas and white camouflaged snow suits to extremes of wet and cold.

At Ladd Field, Fairbanks, where blizzards are constant during the dead of winter and the daily thermometer reading averages 15 degrees below zero.

High Court Gets Ballot Appeal

ATLANTA, Ga., Sept. 14—(UP)—The problem of the legality of Georgia's county unit voting system which allowed a gubernatorial candidate who received the most votes to be defeated, today rested with the U. S. supreme court.

An appeal was directed to the nation's highest tribunal today after a U. S. circuit court of appeals here had recently upheld the unit system in two special hearings.

Attorneys for Georgia citizens who challenged the state's electoral system, asked the supreme court to declare the county unit vote system unconstitutional.

The appeals were signed and forwarded yesterday by Judge Samuel H. Sibley, of the U. S. circuit court of appeals, who presided over the three-judge federal court that on Aug. 28 upheld the unit system in the first hearings.
