The proposal was filed with the UN economic and social council by American Delegate John G. Winant on instructions from Mr. Truman. He suggested that the UN call the conference for the fall or winter of next year and said that the United States would play host to scientists, engineers, research technicians, economists, and other experts from all the

United Nations. In a letter instructing Winant to propose the conference, the president said a world program for the conservation and utilization of natural resources "can become a major basis of peace."
