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# Come On, Admiral

**Fleet Boss King Must Be Jailed if I Am, Correspondent Othman Claims**

George Meader, my legal counsel, says so. He works for the senate war investigating committee when he's not busy advising me on my chances of staying out of a striped suit. Horizontal stripes, whooie. I am in a jam. So is the admiral.

He was sore because he said the committee accused him of spending \$134,000,000 to build a pipeline in Canada and Alaska, when one tanker sailing regularly from Seattle could have carried more oil.

The admiral appeared before the committee to announce that the joint chiefs of staff approved the pipeline; not he alone. He handed to the press copies of the statement he intended to read and included a few letters from big-wigs.

"Then how come Adm. King handed to the press not more than 15 minutes ago this letter from Adm. William D. Leahy to James F. Byrnes?" Sen. Ferguson demanded. "We have a copy of that

letter, but our copy is stamped, secret. We cannot use it."

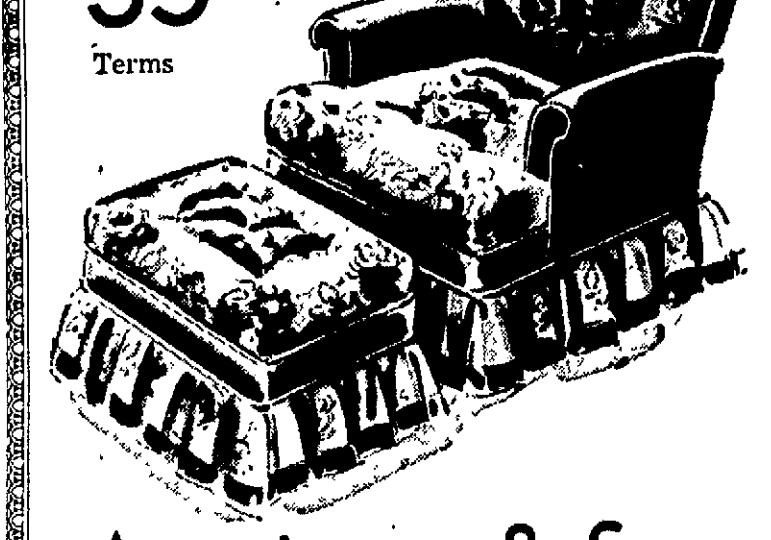
