FOUNDRY FIRE LOSS \$85,000

Earlier Estimate Revised Upward; Machines Damaged

Loss in the Shook Bronze Curn Foundry Fire Wednesday noon was placed at \$85,000 in an estimate report filed Thursday by the fire department.

Building loss was placed at \$25,000 and contents and equipment loss at \$60,000, reported to include complete loss of all seven furnaces, five molding machines and an undetermined number of patterns.

The 150 employees of the concern have been laid off temporarily, but Donald Shook, president, said operations would be resumed on a limited scale the latter part of the week and full operation is to be resumed within a week, then arrangements being made to purchase castings.

LABOR GROUPS SUPPORT LEVY FOR SCHOOLS

AFL and CIO Leaders Announce Endorsement. Urge Vote Approval

Lima's labor groups joined Thursday in an official endorsement of the five-mill school levy which will be placed on the ballot in November.

John Hull, secretary-treasurer of the Lima Central Labor Union-AFL and Joseph B. Emmons, executive secretary of the Lima Regional Council-CIO, announced that their organizations had indicated their unanimous and all-out support of the proposal.

Endorsement of the AFL was made at its regular meeting Sept. 17 and the CIO approval came during the group's meeting Wednesday night.

Labor is deeply interested in the Lima educational system, Hull indicated. We feel that the additional two-mill levy is the means of bringing the salary structure to a reasonable level and of providing facilities and maintenance that are needed for the schools, he added.

"This is an issue that is vital to every citizen," Emmons pointed out. "We have lost many of our competent teachers because they could not work for sub-standard wages and it is every person's duty and responsibility to correct this situation."
