Police Urging London Bureau Be Revamped

CINCINNATI, Oct. 12—(AP)—Recommendation that the Ohio Bureau of Criminal Identification and Information be moved from the London State prison farm to Columbus was made yesterday by the Ohio Association of Police Chiefs. Col. O. H. Cornwell, identification bureau superintendent, proposed the move in a resolution which was adopted unanimously by the police heads, meeting here in annual convention. The proposal also asked that the bureau be operated 24 hours a day, seven days a week with a statewide teletype system, and that convict labor be banned from it. Chief Lester Marston of Columbus was elected president of the association and W. L. Sweet of Springfield and Ross H. Cunningham of Steubenville were chosen first and second vice presidents, respectively. L. B. Miller of Lakewood was re-elected secretary-treasurer.

2 MILLION SEEN FOR OHIO VOTE Nation's Top Stars To Boost Community Chest Campaign

Hike in Registration Caused By Returning Vets

COLUMBUS, Oct. 12—(UP)—Two million Ohioans will probably take time off from their jobs of household duties on Nov. 5 to vote in the general election, the secretary of state's office estimated unofficially today. Increased registrations were reported from most metropolitan centers of the state. Women led the swollen parade to the registration centers and were followed, in order, by World War II veterans and labor recruits. Thirty-four counties in Ohio require pre-election registration. Several counties, including Montgomery, Trumbull and Hamilton, provide for county wide registration. Cuyahoga-co., which normally produces about one-sixth of the state's vote, had more than 650,000 potential voters on the books when the registration closed Oct. 7. In 1940, a peak presidential year, the county had 631,000 qualified voters. The election official reported registration in Columbus was approximately equal to 1942, the last off-year registration when 150,280 voters, qualified. Columbus had 170,000 in 1944. Youngstown and other Mahoning-co. cities set a new record with about 100,000 voters. This total was 4,000 more than in 1940 and 2,000 more than in 1942, according to election board records. Summit-co. registrations exceeded by 15,000 the 1942 mark of 142,197. That figure topped the presidential year totals of 153,629 in 1940 and 150,377 in 1944. The registration in Toledo reached 120,000 as compared with 100,059 in 1942, but was considerably lower than presidential year marks. County-wide registration in Montgomery-co. produced 180,000 voters, an increase over the 168,962 registration mark of 1944. Before 1944 the registration area was more limited, making comparisons impossible. Election officials declined to predict what the state-wide boom in registration indicated. In recent years, however, a heavy vote in an election usually produced more gains for Democrats than for Republicans. Observers are watching to determine whether the heavy registration substantiates reports of a heavy anti-Democratic trend.
