USE OF HOUSING FUNDS STUDIED

Legion Asked To Suggest Putnam Solution

OTTAWA, Oct. 16—Use of \$23,000 which Putnam-co has received for temporary veterans' housing will depend considerably upon recommendations of the county American Legion council.

This was learned here today from the board of county commissioners which must make the final decision on the use of this money. The board explained it feels the funds should be used where most needed and the Legionnaires are best situated to determine this need.

The money was allocated to the county by the state from a special appropriation set up for housing of veterans and their families.

The commissioners have requested the Legion council to make its recommendations as quickly as possible so steps can be taken to utilize the special allocation at the earliest possible date.

Miss Mary Hall Will Reign Oct. 27

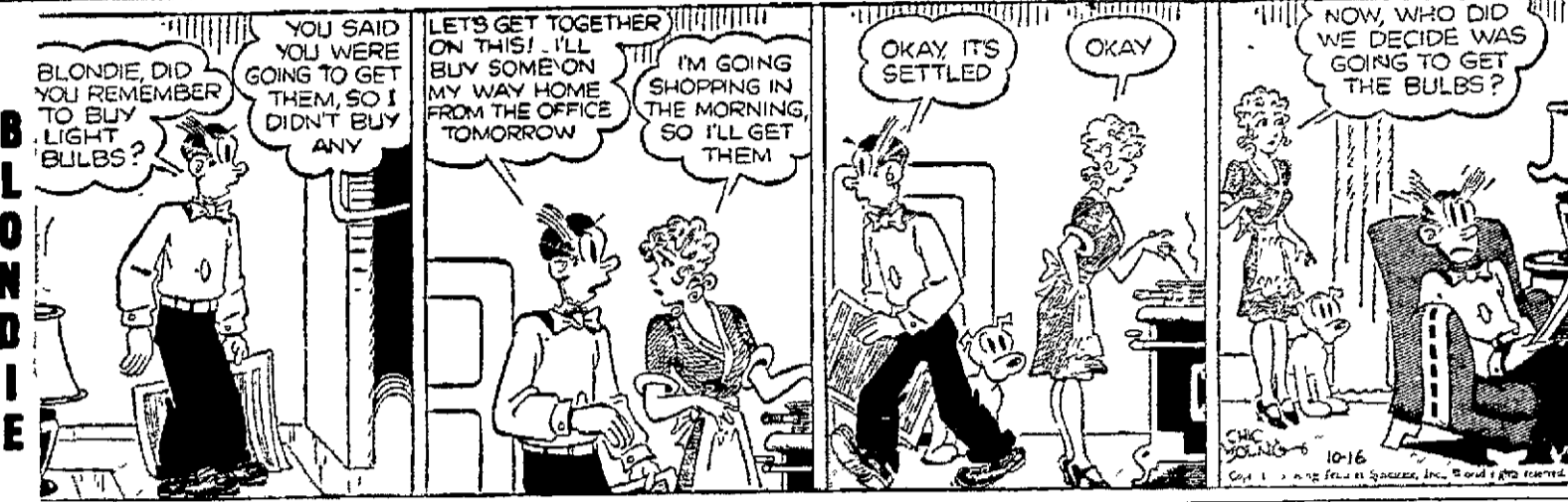
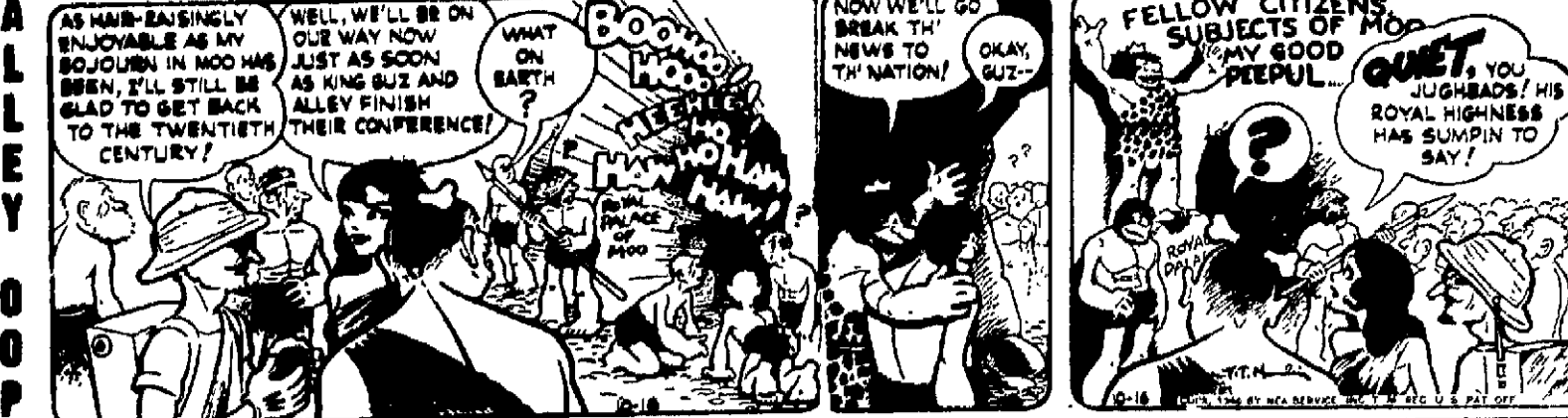

Slot Machine Cases Opened COLUMBUS, Oct. 16—(AP)—Rehearing of the cases against Trumbull-co liquor permit holders charged with possession of slot machines opened today with state-introduced testimony showing purchase by permittees of federal slot machine use stamps for last year.

This testimony, resulting from recent investigation by the State Department of Liquor Control, was stipulated by Asst. Atty. Gen. Charles Schurr against permit holders as the hearing began.

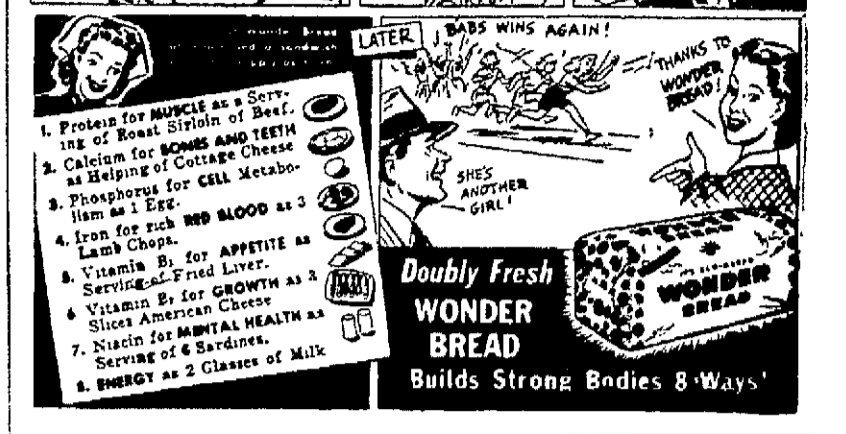
Schurr also produced before the state liquor control board several express company receipts showing that in March and April of 1946 James Merrill—identified in original testimony as "Jimmy" and

"Turtle" who placed machines in various Trumbull-co taverns—received several slot machine shipments.

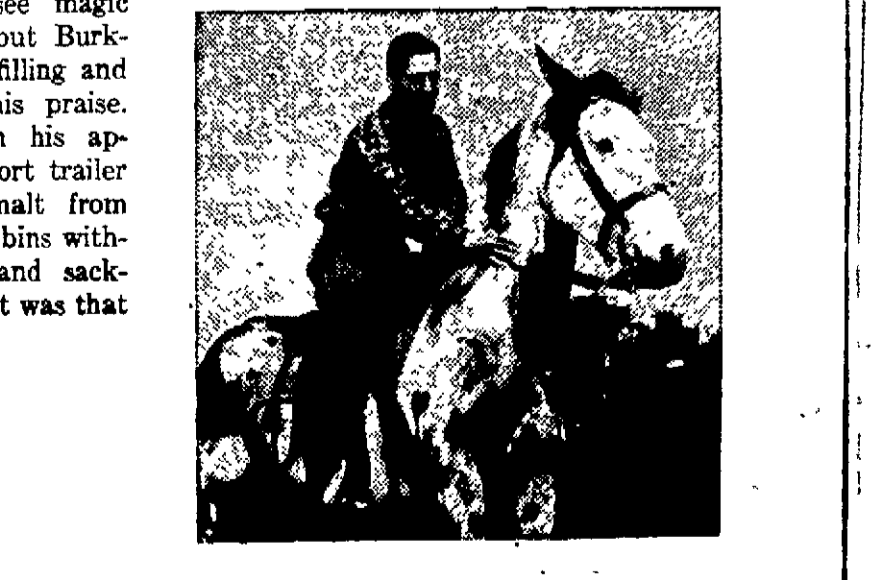


Meet the man who turns Eskimo every morning
