QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS ON SERVICEMEN'S PROBLEMS

WASHINGTON, Oct. 17 — (NEA)—Here are some questions from veterans regarding the change in National Service Life Insurance made recently:

Q—I have not gotten along well with my brother since we were children. I am not married, and aside from my brother my mother is the only living relative I have. My mother is the beneficiary of my government insurance. If I should die and my mother got all my insurance, would my brother get that money after my mother's death?

A—Under the present law as altered by a recent amendment, you can name any person you wish as either primary or contingent beneficiary. If your mother dies, and then you die, before you get a chance to change your beneficiary, the insurance will go into your estate, and your brother will get his share of it when your estate is probated. If your mother should receive your insurance and your brother is still alive when she dies, your mother's will will determine whether or not your brother will eventually receive part of your insurance. The only way you can make sure that your brother doesn't get a share of your insurance, regardless of what happens—and that is apparently what you are worried about—is to make your mother primary beneficiary and to name another person as contingent beneficiary.

Q—I named my mother beneficiary in my government insurance. Since then she has died. I assume that my father will be the beneficiary now. Is this true?

A—No. If there is no beneficiary named in your policy now, the proceeds in the event of your death will be placed in your estate. And your estate will be divided by the court, which is sometimes a costly and time-consuming business.

Q—Can I now name a person who is not a relative as primary beneficiary of my government insurance?

A—Yes.

Underwater Jeep Is Being Planned

WASHINGTON, Oct. 18 — (UP)—The versatile jeep is now being turned into an underwater vehicle. The Navy and Marine Corps plan to adapt some 1,000 jeeps for underwater operation with "deep water fording kits" made by the Willys-Overland Motor Corp.

The kits, costing about \$1,000 each, will permit a jeep to operate in water one foot higher than its hood for 15 minutes. Chief use will be in fording streams and in beach landings.

A demonstration was held recently at Beverly Beach, Md., on the Chesapeake Bay.

Marine Sgt. Roy Harmon, Wash., D. C., clad in a one-piece rubber suit, maneuvered the tiny truck at speeds up to 10 miles an hour with only his head above the water.

Harmon splashed the jeep into the shallow water, drove it about and then buzzed up and down the beach to demonstrate its versatility.

The underwater jeep will be equipped with periscope-like intake and exhaust manifolds. They also will have waterproof distributors and ignition coils, aviation-type spark plugs and an aluminum carburetor housing.

FACES MURDER CHARGE
MANSFIELD, Oct. 18 — (AP)—If Michael Kalis, 52, a steelworker, survives self-inflicted and serious bullet wounds, he will be charged with first degree murder in the slaying of his wife, Helen, 42, and son John, 20. Police Chief Meade K. Bates said today. The police chief said Kalis felled his wife with three bullets yesterday as she fled down the front steps, trapped his son in the kitchen and shot him, then turned the revolver on himself and fired a bullet thru his head. Coroner D. C. Lavender said Kalis had been under sanitarium treatment for "nervousness."

EXPLANATION OF YESTERDAY'S CARTOON
THE SHAMROCK—This emblem of Ireland and of the Doctrine of Trinity has a history long antedating the Emerald Isle. It was sacred to the ancient Iranians of Persia 50 centuries ago as a symbol of their own deistic Trinity. In the recent excavations on the site of ancient Persepolis, the trefoil of clover occurs on all articles of personal adornment. In connection with Ireland, shamrock is first mentioned in a book printed in 1571, which refers to "shamrotes" (shamrock) as a "herbe, the Irish feed upon."

Trucker Dies In Bridge Crash

DELAWARE, Oct. 18 — (INS)—William J. Hammond, 26-year-old Milford Center trucker, was killed instantly late yesterday in a two-truck collision near Delaware.

Sheriff's deputies said Hammond was fatally injured when his truck was struck by a vehicle operated by Thomas P. Harden of Columbus on the one-lane Alum Creek bridge on State Route 36, east of the city.

Harden received minor injuries.

Indiana Strike Threat Averted

SOUTH BEND, Ind., Oct. 18 — (UP)—The threat of a strike against the Indiana and Michigan Electric Co. was averted today after employees voted by an "overwhelming majority" to accept a settlement providing for a nine-cent hourly wage increase.

Joseph Timko, Columbus, O., international representative of the United Mine Workers (AFL), announced the agreement shortly before a midnight deadline last night.

In addition to the nine-cent increase, affecting 500 union members, the company offer also provided a three-cent hourly wage boost for about 100 additional highly-skilled employees.

Jap Invasion Plans Are Told

TOKYO, Oct. 18 — (INS)—Testimony that Emperor Hirohito approved Japanese army plans for the invasion of Russia were heard today at the Tokyo war crimes trial.

Former Lt. Col. Fejima Ruiko, a Soviet prisoner of war, said under cross examination, that he saw the general staff order concerning the invasion plans for 1941 and 1942. He added that the document said

that the plans had "received the sanction of the throne."

The defense tried to bring out the thought that the plan itself was only a routine process. The witness, however, said he did not know whether that was true.
